Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any one over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but Sub-Agency on certain conditions.
Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.
On certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a part of section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, stony or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

CANADIAN SHIPS IN LAKE TRAFFIC

WASHINGTON, Sept. 24.—Representative Alexander, chairman of the merchant marine committee of the House, today offered a bill that would permit Canadian lake steamers to engage in traffic on the Great Lakes between American ports.

The bill is intended mainly to permit foreign ships to engage in coastwise shipping between United States ports in order to relieve congestion in the coastwise trade caused by the removal of many coastwise ships for transoceanic trade.

The bill specifies that the Shipping Board may license ships to engage in such trade, irrespective of American laws on the subject. Heretofore vessels of Canadian registry have been unable to ply between American ports, but the Canadian government has opened its harbors to American ships.

SCREENINGS NEEDED FOR FEED IN CANADA.

OTTAWA, Sept. 24.—An Order-in-Council has been passed prohibiting the exportation of "screenings" except under license. This action of the Government is the result of recent investigations of the feed situation in Canada by the Minister of Agriculture.

The maintenance of swine and poultry production will be dependent on the assurance of larger feed supplies. Under the present high prices of mill feeds, and the necessity of conserving for human consumption all milling wheat and other grains, there is likely to be a serious liquidation of cattle in the prairie provinces, unless the supplies of feed from other sources are available.

The screenings from the elevators appear to constitute such a source. In former years these screenings, constituting whole and broken grain, buckwheat, flax and weed seeds, were a by-product of small or no value. Little demand existed for them in Canada but an outlet was found in the United States, and with the advancing price of grain during the past three years, a very profitable market for screenings has been developed. Investigation showed, however, that nearly 90 per cent of all this much-needed material was given to the United States market.

The prohibitory order has been passed for the sole purpose of improving the serious condition now confronting the live stock industry of Canada.

The Minister of Agriculture has called a conference in Winnipeg for September 25. Invitations to attend have been sent to representatives of the various grain grower associations, elevator companies, live stock associations, the secretary of the Grain Exchange and the chairman of the Board of Grain Growers, and to the Provincial Departments of Agriculture will also be present. A thorough discussion of the whole subject will take place.

SAYS U.S. ARMY OF 2,000,000 WILL WIN WAR

NEW YORK, Sept. 24.—Dr. Benjamin Rand of Harvard University, who has just returned from the west front where he watched the operations of the British army, said today in his opinion the United States should send an army of 2,000,000 men abroad to help wage the fight if the war with Germany is to be won.

A small expeditionary force, said Dr. Rand, would mean undue sacrifice of man power, which experience England went through early in the war, because she could not help herself, being compelled to use what available troops were at her disposal.

"Inasmuch as today the lines of the Germans are unevenly held," he said, "it is the opportunity of America, if only her forces are in sufficient number, to throw such strength against the weakened sections of the great western front as to carry the war to a successful conclusion."

Dr. Rand also visited the British grand fleet.

U-BOAT FOILED BY SMOKE SCREEN

LONDON, Sept. 24.—The Press Association hears of high naval authority that the new defensive measures against submarine warfare are meeting with success, justifying the hope of a further reduction in the losses, and says it can be stated on official authority that the results of the methods adopted in the past month give cause for growing confidence.

According to an Admiralty statement, dozens of ships have been saved by the smoke box system, which the Admiralty during the past few months has supplied to a majority of British merchantmen.

HARDEN THINKS PEACE WILL COME THIS YEAR.

AMSTERDAM, Sept. 24.—Maximilian Harden, lecturing in Berlin yesterday, said he was convinced peace was attainable this year, if Germany promise to waive the right to rule Belgium. This statement aroused a hostile demonstration from the audience.

FAILED TO ESCAPE FROM AMHERST JAIL.

AMHERST, Sept. 24.—Elsworth Sutherland, of Moncton, who is incarcerated in the country jail at Amherst in connection with an extended number of thefts, principally valuable tools, made an effort to break prison today. He was captured while making a flying dive through the parlor window of the jail keeper's abode. Sutherland since being imprisoned has behaved admirably and Jailor Simpson had no idea that the man was planning to make a break for liberty. Today at noon when the jailer entered the rotunda of the cells to feed the prisoners he omitted to lock a door behind him, and it was then that Sutherland slipped past the county officer. The escape started down the stairs. A shout from the jailer warned his son, J. F. Simpson, that something unwonted was happening. The shout likewise alarmed the prisoner, who bolted into the parlor and made a leap through the window. The screen on the outside resisted his efforts, and supported him by the clothing. Caught by legs Sutherland was dragged back to the cell. His alleged deceptions around Amherst amount to over two thousand dollars. He is now awaiting trial.
