COST OF NAVAL WARFARE.

In a recent issue of the London Pictorial Magazine James Wilson contributes a fund of information with regard to the cost of naval warfare under present conditions. For the quicker understanding of the reader we give the figures in our currency in the proportion of five dollars to the pound sterling. A battleship costs considerably more than five million dollars. The King Edward VII cost seven millions, and carries nearly a thousand men, and yet one well directed torpedo, 14 feet long and 14 inches wide, and costing \$1,625 might send this costly ship with her regiment of men to the bottom of the sea. But most naval battles begin and often close with gun fire. Without guns the warship would be practically useless, while the torpedo and the ram are subsidiary. The first object is to overwhelm the enemy as speedily as possible with a hail of projectiles. The defeated fleet will lose ships, guns and men, but the conqueror will also find war an expensive game.

How long a naval action can last it is not easy to say, but it certainly cannot last much longer than the ammunition provided for the main and secondary batteries. A modern battleship can deliver one shot per minute—an 850 pound shell—from each of her four 12-inch guns, but these guns become unsafe, or officially worn out, after firing 100 rounds, which would only occupy 100 minutes of constant action. The cost of these shells and the firing charge is \$233 each. The full 100 rounds for each of the four 12-inch guns would cost \$117,200. The 12-inch guns are designed to pierce the armor and totally destroy the enemy's ship. The 6-inch guns of the secondary battery serve to demolish the upper works and destroy the crews, and can each fire 300 rounds without danger of the gun bursting, the cost of each round being over \$33. The average battleship of the British navy carries 12 six-inch guns each capable of discharging seven shells per minute. Thus one six-inch gun in one minute would dispose of \$230 worth of ammunition, and in a little less than 43 minutes of quick firing would dispose of its full complement of 300 shells at a cost of about \$10,000. The twelve 6-inch guns in the same brief space of less than fifty minutes would fire away powder and projectiles costing \$120,000.

But the battleship also carries a number of smaller guns. Next in order to the 6-inch guns are the 12 pounders, of which one battleship carries eighteen. These are used to repel torpedo boats and to pepper the enemy's gun crews, and so terrorise them as to prevent them making good shooting. The life of the twelve pounder is 700 shots. The cost of each round is about \$7.50. And then there are the six 3-pounders each of which will stand the discharge of 1000 shells in succession. Each of these small shells, including contents and firing charge costs about \$2. And then there are two Maxim guns, for use in repelling boarders, or against torpedo craft, or to shoot down the enemy's men. Each Maxim will fire 35,000 shots before giving out and these cost about \$23 per thousand. Thus a first-class battleship goes into action with \$380,000 worth of ammunition all of which

can be shot away in a few hours at most. If she escapes all harm from the enemy, the cost of powder and projectiles is enormous, while the life time of the very costly guns is shortened by every round and in the larger and more expensive guns this lifetime as we have seen, is limited to 100 rounds.

There are thirteen battleships, to say nothing of first, second and third-class cruisers and other craft in the British Mediterranean fleet, the entire cost of which in round figures is a hundred million dollars. The reader may figure for himself the cost in ammunition alone of an hour's engagement with an enemy of equal strength. Add to this the costly ships, cruisers and torpedo craft blown up, sunk or battered to pieces, the guns worn out or smashed, and all the wreck and ruin wrought by gunfire, torpedo and lastly the ram. For in the final act of the stupendous tragedy, when the ammunition is exhausted, the guns disabled or spent, when the torpedoes have all been discharged, there remains the ram, the most deadly weapon a battleship carries, provided her steam machinery is still intact, and she gets a chance to charge upon the side of her enemy. In this last general melee the ram will play the leading role. Death and destruction will be dealt out in a wholesale manner, and the savings of rival nations, millions and tens of millions of dollars laid out upon floating masses of machinery and engines of destruction, will be dissipated in as many minutes as it took years to accumulate them. We have not mentioned the loss of life and limb, the most fearful cost of all.
