Lenten Sermons At Basilica

Rev. T. C. Peterson this year's special Lenten preacher at St. Dunstan's Basilica, is expected to arrive in city tonight and will begin his series of sermons on Ash Wednesday evening at 7.30 o'clock. Owing to previous engagement of CBC programs, the only sermons to be broadcast from the Basilica this year will be the Wednesday sermons, but through the courtesy of Col. Rogers the public will have the pleasure of hearing Father Peterson's short talks from the studio of CPKY on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays. The first of these studio talks will be given next Thursday evening at 8.30. The following topics will be discussed, under the general title, "Questions Regarding Man's Eternal Destiny."

- Feb. 22: Is Religion a matter of faith only, or also of reason and knowledge?
 - Feb. 24th: Why are there so many different religions?
 - Feb. 27th: Is it possible to test the claims made by the various religions?
 - Feb. 28th: Can the gospels stand scientific testing?
 - March 2nd: Does Christianity accept in full the Old Testament revelations?
 - March 3rd: Is the Old Testament trustworthy as a historical document?
 - March 6th: In what sense is the Bible like all other works of literature?
 - March 7th: In what sense is the Bible different from all other human writings?
 - March 9th: Can the human mind be really indifferent toward truth?
 - March 10: Does truth concern only the human mind, or also the human heart and will?
 - March 13th: Is universal unanimity of faith desirable and possible?
 - March 14th: Can we be our brother's keepers and yet mind our own business in religion?
 - March 16th: Can the interests of superhuman religion truly interfere with the interests of natural science?
 - March 17th: What essential contribution can religion make to our modern system of education?
 - March 20th: Did Christ intend to dispense with all externals in the religion He founded?
 - March 21st: What assurance have we that God listens to our prayers?
 - March 23rd: What sense is there in trusting to the intercession of the Saints?
 - March 24th: Why does the Church make laws which restrict our natural freedom?
 - March 27th: Why should God need sacraments as channels of His graces?
 - March 28th: Why should God need a priesthood, if Christ is head of the Church?
 - March 30th: How can anyone say there is no salvation outside the Church?
 - March 31st: Are not Christ's merits alone all-sufficient to redeem the world?
 - April 3rd: Does the Church teach that virginity is more pleasing to God than the state of matrimony?
 - April 4th: Does the Church teach Mary had any part in the redemption of mankind?
 - April 6th: What does the Church mean by Christ's sacramental real presence?
 - April 7th: Why does the Cross symbolize to us the whole of the Christian religion?
- Father Peterson, who is a noted Scripture scholar, will preach on the general topic of "Truths of the Spiritual Life" in his series for Wednesday and Sunday evening sermons from the Basilica pulpit, and he will also preach at the High Mass at eleven o'clock every Sunday morning.
