The coldest temperature up till nine p. m. yesterday was ten degrees above zero and the highest was twenty one above. At nine a. m. the mercury stood at twelve above. The coldest the previous night was eight degrees above.

Yesterday morning the Earl Grey arrived in this city about eleven o'clock making remarkably fast time on the trip. She encountered a considerable quantity of ice on the way over. The Minto crossed from Georgetown to Pictou and this morning the usual trips will be made, the Earl Grey leaving this port and the Minto crossing to Georgetown.

This day forty-seven years ago, January 14th, 1863, James Chandler, brother of our esteemed citizen, William Chandler, lost his life while on board of the Hillsboro River. The funeral cortege was one of the largest ever seen in Charlottetown being under the auspices of the Volunteer Militia and the Sons of Temperance. The following is copied from the Island Minister published at the time by the Island Bird and gifted poet John L. Page, and which is of historic interest.

The second teams are—Victorias—Wellner, McQuaid, Acora, Gillis, B. Rattenbury, McDonald and Gregory, and the Abegweits—Saunders, Hennessy, Reid, Sweeney, McGee, McLeod and Warburton.

The Prince Edward Island railway is again resuming the customary order of things after the recent blockade. All the lines are now clear with the exception of the Murray Harbor branch. The train which has for days been attempting to reach this city, at an early hour last night, was still stuck hard and fast near Uigg. A clearing train from this city, consisting of three engines and full crew and equipped for snow fighting, was working last night between Vernon and Uigg and it is probable that the snow bound south will be relieved after the unavoidable interruption in their train service, by this afternoon.

Last night at the Y. M. C. A. a hard fought game of basketball was witnessed between the Abegweits and Victorias Senior teams. The game was the fastest of the season and an idea of the close playing may be had from the fact that at half time the score stood 11-10. In the first half considerable fouling on the part of the Victorias gave the Abegweits many chances for throws which they did not fail to take full advantage of. The second half was exciting, the advantage lying with the Vics most of the time. The game ended Victorias 21, Abegweits 24. The Senior teams have to their credit the games following: Victorias 3, Abegweits 2, P. W. C. 1 and S. D. C. none. In the intermediate game the second P. W. C. won easily from the second Abegweits by a score of 24 to 8. The game was rather one-sided.

We will never forget you and shall look back to this school of later life, not as a place of penance, but as a scene of mental enjoyment, where the paths of learning were strewn with flowers; and whenever memory recalls our school days, our hearts will warm toward you as they do today. I have been requested by my school-mates here to address you formally, but as a beloved and respected friend, in that light, dear teacher, we all regard you. Please accept with our little present, our earnest good wishes. May you always be as happy as you have endeavored to make your pupils and may they, no thing better could be wished for them be always as faithful to their duties to others as you have been in your duties to them.
