Great interest is being taken in the Penmanship competition for the gold medal which is to be awarded Christmas. The papers will be submitted to the leading penmanship institute in America for correction.

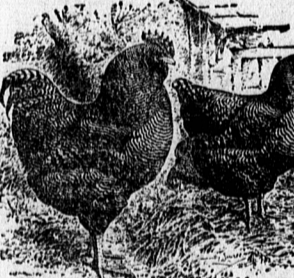
New desks are being installed to accommodate the rapidly growing classes.

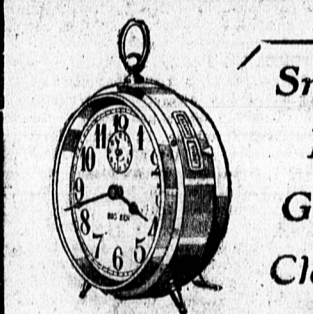

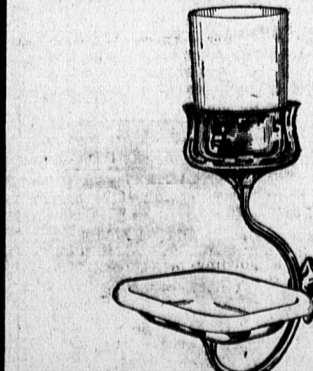

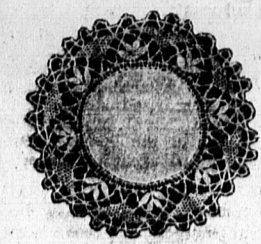
