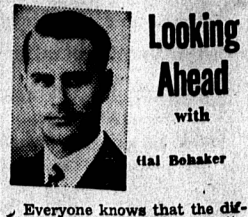

Air Cadet University Scholarships

An appeal to provide university scholarships for deserving air cadets was made by Sergeant George S. Burchill in a recent editorial in the Maritime Air Cadet. This appeal was directed not only to members of the Local and Provincial Air Cadet Committees but to all people who are interested in assisting capable and worthy cadets.

Several hundred-dollar donations have already been received by the chairman of the Nova Scotia Provincial Committee as scholarships for outstanding cadets. In Charlottetown the R.A.F. Officers' Mess voted \$100.00 as a scholarship fund for Air Cadets. This subscription was gratefully taken in trust by the provincial Government which in turn volunteered to augment the yearly interest to the sum of \$75. This annual scholarship is open to any Air Cadet in third or fourth year at Prince of Wales College.

Burchill also suggested the establishment of an Air Force College corresponding to the Royal Military College at Kingston, Ont. The Maritime Air Cadet, popularly known as MAC, is a monthly publication circulated throughout the three Maritime Provinces. It is edited by a staff of which Burchill is the editor-in-chief.

George Burchill, a prominent student at Harkness High School, belongs to No. 315 (Newcastle) Air Cadet Squadron. His hobby is model-making and his goal is mechanical engineering. Sgt. J. A. Colson of Glace Bay is on the staff of MAC as editor. For several years Capt. Alex Mills of Summerside has acted as editor for Prince Edward Island.

Self-Watering Seed Box Helps Get Early Start
Amateur gardeners who start find success easier if they make use of the latest device for watering-wick feeding. You bore a hole in the bottom of a shallow box (seedsmen sell them knocked down); insert a wick, preferably of fibre glass, about 4 inches long. A lamp wick, or even a piece of cotton clothesline will serve quite well. The box is elevated on two pieces of wood so that the lower end of the wick can be immersed in water in a saucer, pan, or what have you. This simple device solves the most difficult problem of managing a seed box, which is watering. Keep the reservoir filled, and the soil in the box will remain at just the right state of dampness, without dripping or drying.
