Hearts May Break

Physiological Possibility, Says London Medical Expert

LONDON, March 30.—"It is emotion that kills, and not hard work," said Dr. J. Strickland Goddard, the well-known cardiologist in a lecture at the Institute of Hygiene.

In sedentary workers who took little exercise the heart became soft and flabby. It was the hearts of this type which had made the fortunes of German spas.

An experiment on a man running to catch a train showed that before starting his heart did 152 foot-pounds of work a minute. After finishing his run it did 360 foot-pounds.

Edmund Proulx (Prescott) seconded the resolution, remarking that Canada is adding to her troubles by admitting immigrants of the artisan class who went to cities.

Turkish Govt. Sends Protest

CONSTANTINOPLE, Mar. 31.—The Turkish Government today made public a note to the Allies protesting formally against the Greek offensive on Asia Minor. The Government declares the offensive constitutes unjustified aggression against Turkey at a moment when the Allies are seeking to solve peacefully the near eastern problems.
