Last Friday Stefania obtained a pass to visit Carolina at Ellis Island and took her place in the detention pen. Carolina slipped out and has not been seen since. Determined to escape, Stefania waited until Carolina was surely safe and then refused to eat. Three days of this, and her condition necessitated removal to the hospital. Discrepancies between her description and that of the little immigrant whose place she had taken led to discovery of her ruse. Stefania was placed under arrest charged with aiding an alien to enter the country unlawfully, and faces a maximum sentence of five years in prison and \$2,000 fine. Downward Trend of Prices Is Slowing Up

Average Price of Weekly Budget for a Family of Five \$11.41 as Compared With 10.96 in July

OTTAWA, Sept. 16.—The average price of the weekly budget for a family of five in sixty Canadian cities was \$11.41 at the beginning of August as compared with \$10.96 at the beginning of July, according to figures compiled by the Department of Labor. This covers 29 staple foods and an examination of the different items shows that practically the entire increase is accounted for by potatoes and butter. The seasonal rise in these commodities has been accentuated by the dry hot summer. Wholesale prices show hardly any change between July and August. The continued downward movement which began in May, 1920 has slowed up very considerably, and there is a disposition to consider that the liquidation in prices has been to a great extent accomplished and that with good crops improved transportation facilities and better financial conditions there may be better demand in markets which have been weak for over a year.

BELIEVES JOHNSON AND DEMPSEY WOULD MAKE GREAT BATTLE IN RING

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—A fight between Dempsey and Johnson (unless the years have taken much from the negro) should be a masterly exhibition of heavyweight skill, and if the fight materializes it will without doubt live in fight history as a great battle. This statement is made with the assumption that the fight is to be strictly on the level. There is some reason for assuming this—and there is always reserved the right to have our doubts. Johnson's career in and out of the ring is nothing spotless, and he has no right to expect the confidence and admiration of the American fight public. But he can fight, or at least he could fight some time ago. Whether or not he will be able and willing as he was once capable of fighting is an open question. The writer believes that Sam Langford at his best could have whipped Dempsey, and that Johnson at his best could have taken the measure of the great white heavyweight. Perhaps we are wrong in this opinion, but it is shared with hundreds of other followers of the fight game. But Johnson is getting old—old for a fighter, at least—and it is no certainty that he retains his old punch and speed.
