ELECTION LAW IN FRENCH SENATE

Proportional Representation Makes Question of Confidence.

PARIS, March 18 (Special)—A debate fraught with the gravest issues opened in the Senate here. The government's electoral reform bill, after being adopted by the Chamber of Deputies on July 10, 1912, was sent to committee by the Senate. The committee, which was presided over by Mr. Georges Clemenceau, formerly Premier, has now returned the bill, but without the clauses providing for proportional representation. The debate is likely to be a long and fierce one, as the government makes the principle of proportional representation a question of confidence, and it is pointed out in the lobby that the refusal of the Senate to vote this principle is liable to bring about not only a Ministerial crisis but a deadlock between the two houses, which can be settled only by dissolution.

The electoral reform bill, which was adopted by the Chamber of Deputies by a vote of 339 to 217, provides for the abolition of the system of small constituencies established in 1876, whereby each elector votes for one deputy only and substitutes for it the system of list voting, by which each elector votes for as many deputies as the entire department has to elect. It also introduces a system to provide for the representation of minorities, by which, after the poll is taken, the total number of actual voters in the department is divided by the number of seats to be filled, and the seats are then divided proportionately among the candidates of the different parties.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$20 per acre.
