## FOCH PRAYED DAILY

New York Minister Says War Never Stopped Marshal's Devotion.

"Marshal Foch was never too busy to spend one full hour every day during the war in prayer, and he did not think the time wasted," said Rev. Dr. Christian R. A. Reiser in a sermon in Chelsea Methodist Church. "During the dark days of the war, an American fighting with the Canadian troops wandered into a cathedral to see and remained to worship," continued Dr. Reiser. "He noticed a distinguished military man enter, seek a secluded spot and kneel in prayer. With American curiosity our soldier watched the officer and saw that he remained on his knees for one hour. The American followed him out to find it was Marshal Foch. The lad wrote this fact to his mother in Iowa.

"It was reported that when the days were darkest, Clemenceau, the Premier, who avowed no faith in God and cultivated no religious life, grew almost hopeless in an interview with Foch. The latter rose before Clemenceau with calm dignity and said, God lives and the enemy shall not prevail." And in this spirit he went out to continue his campaign when the brain unlighted by the faith of God saw no hope ahead.
