"SKETCHY" WEAR BANNED IN BRITAIN LONDON, July 27.—A campaign against diaphanous dress among women church-goers is being conducted by high church dignitaries in England, and it is understood that the question of women's "sketchy" attire may be taken up shortly by a big church association. Monsignor Jackson, of Westminster Cathedral, said that some women attend places of worship in clothes which are not in accord with Christian principles. No rule about wedding dress is laid down, however, the matter being entirely one of the taste of brides, he said. The campaign is also being strongly waged in France and Belgium by the clergy in those countries, and several high dignitaries of the church have spoken strongly on the subject. Notices are posted at the doors of many French churches to the effect that women who wish to enter must be decently clothed.

MONTREAL, July 28.—Sixteen desertions from the steamer Scandinavien and nine from the Grandinavian are recorded put forward before Judge Cusson in the police court today when the ninth man on the Grandinavian was charged with desertion. As he was the only man apprehended the judge was asked by prosecuting counsel to make an example of him. Judge Cusson found the prisoner, John Grampian, who had signed on at Antwerp, guilty, and sentenced him to fifteen days hard labor together with the forfeiture of wages for the last voyage, which amounted to about thirty dollars.

FASHIONS FOR CANADIANS There's no gainsaying the charm of striped and checked material for tailored apparel. This is especially true of the chic cape as illustrated. This cape to coats and wraps for sports or motor wear. Every season fabric manufacturers offer an amazing array of plaids in different colors and color blendings. Not satisfied with this, sartorial manufacturers and tailors in heavy silk floss in any may be made of plain color material in a preferred color, stitching to be matched by the collar and arm-hole facing, which is extended to form a V-shaped panel. Brown tricotine or light-weight velour might be adorned with red or tan, green or a lighter blue and so on. The cape has a rather deep, round yoke, and the collar may be worn open or closed. A clever idea for making over an old blue serge cape was worked out recently by an ingenious woman. She lined it throughout with natural colored pongee, stitched the cape in light tan silk to match, and finished it at the neck with a big collar of the pongee. Knitted silk fabrics, as good looking and effective while new, but which give such doubtful value because of their stretching tendency, are employed with very good effect in the development of many warmer-weather capes. One of the simplest styles is that which shows a long scarf yoke—merely a straight piece of the material of the desired width—to which is attached, ruffle fashion, another section of the material cut as long as the cape is to be. The scarf yoke should be cut lengthwise of the fabric, of course, and, if desired yoke and cape proper may be in different colors. Style designers bring out additional novelties by stitching plain material, with extremely pleasing results.

THE SHAMROCK In the Hudson HER FUTURE UNDECIDED—OFFERS TO BUY HER HAVE BEEN MADE BY SEVERAL YACHTSMEN. NEW YORK, July 28.—Shamrock IV, the defeated cup challenger left Sandy Hook shortly after noon today for an anchorage in the Hudson River. The crew of Shamrock accompanied the yacht in the house boat Killarney, which has been their home during the regatta. The challenger was still flying the little green flag, and passing steamers gave her almost a continuous ovation of whistle salutes as she passed up the harbor. Sr. Thomas' Linton, owner of Shamrock, said today that he had not made up his mind what he would do with the racer and the trial boat, the 23 meter Shamrock. It is understood that he has received offers for both yachts from United States yachtsmen. The crew of the challenger will be sent home on the first available ship. Sir Thomas said, adding "those boys have wives and little ones whom they are anxious to see." FRANCISCO VILLA BANDIT LEADER SURRENDERS. EAGLE PASS, Tex., July 28.—Francisco Villa, bandit leader, surrendered unconditionally after an all night conference with General Eugene Martinez, commanding the Torreón military zone, according to advices received by the Mexican consul here today. Villa will return to private life, the message adds. Much rejoicing throughout Mexico is reported with celebrations being arranged. Car Haeblin, United States citizen, president of a brewery at Sabinas, who had been held by Villa for ransom, has been released, the report adds.

Hon. Dr. Tolmie Sworn in Today. OTTAWA, July 28.—The last of the Meighan cabinet ministers to be sworn in, Dr. S. F. Tolmie, head of the Agricultural Department, will take the oath of office Friday morning on his return from the West where he has been attending live stock exhibitions. Hon. Arthur Meighan is scheduled to leave for Portage La Prairie at Midnight Friday, to be the guest of honor at a public reception on Monday to commemorate his election to the premiership. ST. JOHN, N.B., July 27.—All war veterans who were under treatment at the provincial hospital for nervous diseases in Lancaster were removed yesterday to the hospital at St. Anne de Bellevue where all soldiers suffering from nervous breakdown will in future be treated.

GETS TWO YEARS IN DORCHESTER PENITENTIARY. MONCTON, N.B., July 28.—Fred Baucher, aged nineteen years, was sentenced by County Court Judge Bennett, to two years in Dorchester penitentiary today. Baucher was arrested in Sackville a few days ago, charged with attempting to pass a forged check amounting to \$89 and carrying the signature of H. C. Anderson, a harness maker of Amherst (N.S.). The trial took place under the speedy trials act.

Greeks Defeat Turkish Troops. CONSTANTINOPLE, July 29.—Attacking Greeks east of Bourzas, an organized army of Mustafa Kemal was repulsed with heavy losses, it was reported today.

Russian Comms. Coming to England. (Dom. Press Special.) REVAL, July 29.—The Bolshevik trade commission, on route to London, is expected to arrive there next week. Following the removal of the British embargo on trade with Russia, the commissioners are passing through here.

Airship Service Germany to U. S. (Dom. Press Special.) BERLIN, July 29.—There are prospects of linking Germany and America by a line of airships, director Coleman of the Zeppelin works, declared today upon his arrival from the United States.

In Memoriam LATE NATHANIEL MCLAREN. The death occurred yesterday afternoon of Mr. Nathaniel McLaren in his home in Montague, after a protracted illness. The deceased was a son of the late Hon. James McLaren one of the early settlers of New Perth and was born in New Perth in 1846 being therefore in his 74th year. He was a prominent farmer and miller having owned and conducted the Brudenell Mills for some fifty years. He was a life long member of the Christian Church at Montague, a consistent Christian, a kind and charitable neighbor and friend and one who held the esteem and affection of all who knew him. He is survived by his wife and two sons, James and William, and a daughter, Miss Margaret McLaren, of St. E. Island Railway, Charlottetown, to all of whom the Guardian tenders sincere sympathy.

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
