LONDON April 23. (U. P.)—There are no bow-legs in Batavia, according to Sir John Bland-Sutton, famous British surgeon.

Neither are there knock-knees, or rickets, he discovered while on a world tour with his wife in fact, Batavia would be an ideal place for Flo Ziegfeld and other producers to recruit their choruses and gather inspiration for theme songs.

"In Batavia," Sir John said, "we found young girls whose fine figures and perfect limbs I would like to see on every young woman in this country."

"No bow-legs or knock-knees there. True, the sun is constant and these young women wore only a native covering which hung from their waists to their knees. There could be no rickets in that country."

MONUMENT TO FRENCH HEROINE OF ORLEANS (Canadian Press)

TORONTO, Ont., April 23—"The 500th anniversary of the martyrdom of Joan of Arc is not to pass unnoticed in Canada," says Fred Williams in the Mail and Empire. "It will be celebrated a Quebec—ETAOIN celebrated at Quebec some time this summer; the monument to be erected at Bergeville, in Sillery parish, will not be ready for the actual date; it was on May 30, 1431, that the Maid of Orleans gave her life for France; but it is hoped to have the ceremony take place before the Autumn.

"The monument to be erected is quite a pretentious one. Joan of Arc will be shown mounted on a white charger, saluting Canada with her spear. Around the base of the statue will be large figures representing women and men who have played their part in Canadian history. On one side will be Mgr. de Laval, the first Bishop of Quebec; the Venerable Motir Maerie de l'Incarnation, founder of the Ursulines; Mother Catherine de Saint Augustine, the first of the Augustines; Father Dolbeau, the first Recollet priest in New France; and Jeanne Mance, founder of the Hotel Dieu of Montreal. On the other side will be figures of Jacques Cartier, the discoverer of Canada; Samuel de Champlain, the founder of Quebec; Louis Herbert, the first farmer in Canada; the Venerable Mother Marguerite Bourgeoys, founder of the Congregation of Notre Dame; Maisonneuve, the founder of Ville Marie (Montreal); Jean de Brebeuf, the martyr; and Abbe de Queyul, the first Sulpician. The figure of Jacques Cartier has been supplied by the Province of Quebec; that of Maisonneuve by the city of Montreal; and the others by the religious orders concerned or by private donors.

"A special commemorative volume is in preparation to mark the occasion, among the promised contributors being Georges Goyau, of the French Academy; Mgr. Henri Debut, the great historian of Joan of Arc; Canon Thellier de Poncheville, of Paris; Mgr. Camille Roy, of the Quebec Seminary; Hon. Thamos Chapais; Jean Bruchesi, of the University of Montreal; and, it is hoped, some clerical and civil leaders of Protestant life in Canada, for it is believed that many broad-minded English-Canadians will, in the more true light of history, join in thus honoring the Maid of Orleans, who, as one French-Canadian author has written 'by saving France enabled Canada to be founded.' Many Ontarians will doubtless witness the ceremony, the date of which will be announced later."

"TIGER'S" CAREER ENDS; FOUGHT AT JUTLAND (Canadian Press)

PLYMOUTH, England, April 23—H. M. S. Tiger recently returned to Plymouth with the other ships of the Atlantic fleet and then went up the harbor to Devonport flying a paying-off pennant which marked the end of her career as a fighting unit of the Navy. She is to be scrapped.

This famous ship was laid down on June 20, 1912, at Clydebank, and, having been launched on Dec. 15, 1913, she was finally completed in October, 1914, at a cost of \$10,437,455. Her normal displacement is 28,500 tons, her length over all is 704 feet, 6 inches, and her maximum draught 34 feet. She is armed with eight 13.5 inch guns, 12 6 inch, four 4 inch high angle, four 3-pounders, and four 21 inch submerged torpedo tubes. Her 85,000 h.p. turbines, the steam for which is supplied by 39 boilers, gave her a speed of between 28 and 30 knots, and at this speed she burns about 1,200 tons of oil-fuel a day. Her annual upkeep is \$918,400, and since her completion she has had several refits, each costing large sums of money. During the Great War she served with Admiral Beatty in the Grand Fleet, taking part in the action off the Dogger Bank and in the Battle of Jutland.

At Jutland she was the fourth ship in the line until H. M. S. Queen Mary ahead of her was blown up, and then the Tiger took her place astern of the Princess Royal. During this battle the Tiger was hit 21 times, but her casualties were only 24 killed and 37 wounded, which seemed to bear out the claim that she was the most soundly constructed ship ever built. In recent years she has been the gunnery practice ship at Portland, until she was recommissioned with a Devonport crew on May 17, 1929, for service with the Battle Cruiser Squadron, Atlantic Fleet. During this, her last commission, she specialized in winning the Roonman Cup for racing cutters, the Fleet boxing cup, the King's cup for football, and all the tug-of-war cups, so, after she has come under the hammer, she will not be forgotten.

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., April 23—Butter continued steady on the produce and dairy market here today as did cheese, eggs and potatoes.

Number one finest butter was quoted unchanged at 22 cents and regraded remained at 22 to 22 1-2 cents a pound. To retailers solids and prints were unchanged at 26 and 27 cents a pound, respectively. Receipts were 466 boxes.

Ontario colored cheese was quoted at 10 1-2 cents a pound and receipts totalled 108 boxes.

On the egg market, carlot prices of fresh Quebec, maritime, Ontario and prairie extras were quoted at 22 to 23 cents, firsts at 20 to 21 cents and seconds at 17 to 18 cents a dozen. Fresh British Columbia extras in carlots, were quoted at 24 cents, firsts at 22 cents and seconds at 19 1-2 cents a dozen. To retailers quotations were unchanged and receipts were 2,334 cases.

New Brunswick green mountain potatoes, in carlots, were quoted at 80 cents per eighty pound bag and to retailers 90 cents per eighty pound bag.

OTTAWA, Ont., April 23—An easy tone continues to prevail on egg markets in eastern Canada today but prices are holding about steady. The situation in the maritime is now commencing to reflect the weaker market in Ontario and Quebec.

TORONTO—This egg market continues easy and dealers are now quoting producers and country shippers for eggs extras 18 to 19, firsts 16 to 17, seconds 13 to 14 delivered, cases returned. Dealers are making sales of ordinary packed Ontario eggs at extras 20, firsts 18, seconds 16, delivered. Storage packed eggs are offering for one-cent above these prices. Wholesale prices of eggs retail stores here are extras 23, firsts 21, seconds 18.

MONTREAL—Egg receipts here today were 2,234 cases as compared to 2,195 cases for the corresponding day last year. The market continues dull and easy. Carlots of western eggs are now offering at extras 22, firsts 20 delivered.

SAINT JOHN, N. B.—This eggs market is reflecting the weakness being displayed at Montreal and Toronto. Production is continuing to show some seasonal increase but is not as heavy as last year. Wholesale prices of eggs to retailers here are extras 25 to 27, firsts 22 to 25, seconds 19 to 21.

HALIFAX, N. S.—Although there have been no price changes on the local egg market recently a slightly easier undertone is apparent with receipts increasing. Demand is good with retailers reporting the heaviest sales for years. Dealers are quoting producers and country shippers for eggs extras 20 to 21, firsts 19 to 20, seconds 15 to 16. Wholesale prices to retailers are extras 27 to 28, firsts 24 to 25, seconds 21 to 22.

POETS FUND CLOSED

(Canadian Press) LONDON, April 23—The testimonial on behalf of Sir William Watson, the aged English poet, has now been officially closed at \$19,600. In addition to the money there are also the titles—deeds of Arundel House, Peacehaven, Sussex. This house was lent to the poet by the late Lord Brotherton over three years ago, when illness compelled Sir William to leave his Westmorland home. The deeds are the gift of Charles and Dorothy Una Ratcliffe, co-executors of the late Lord Brotherton.

The appeal committee will administer the fund for the poet, his wife and their two daughters. The money is being invested on behalf of the committee by Reginald McKenna, chairman of the Midland Bank.

FORSBERG LEADS BASEBALLERS

(MANHATTAN, Kans., April 23—(U. P.)—W. A. Forsberg, Lindsay, Kansas, has been elected captain of the Kansas State Agricultural College's baseball team replacing W. H. Meisinger, Abilene, Texas, who was found ineligible after an investigation during the past football season. Forsberg, a track letter-man, plays first or second base and is a good fielder and a timely hitter.
