**MRS. JOHN NOY**

On Thursday night January 9th 1941, she passed peacefully away at her home in Village Green one of the oldest citizens of Prince Edward Island in the person of Mrs. John Noy. Born at Hazelbrook December 24th 1840. Mrs. Noy had reached the advanced age of one hundred years and sixteen days. Mrs. Noy, whose maiden name was Mary Ann McDonald, was the last surviving member of the family of the late Mr. and Mrs. John McDonald. Although confined to her bed for the past two years, Mrs. Noy was in possession of all her faculties until two months previous to her death when she began to fail, and it became evident that her life was drawing to a close. The funeral service which was held at her home at 2 o'clock on Saturday afternoon, Jan. 11th, was conducted by her pastor Rev. D. K. Ross, B. A. of Pownal United Church, and her remains were interred in Pownal Cemetery beside those of her husband who predeceased her twenty-two years ago and her only son James whose sudden passing two years ago, came as a shock from which she never fully recovered. **THREE TRIPS TO MAGDALENES**—Canadian Airways pilots took advantage of yesterday's ideal flying conditions to make three trips to the isolated Magdalen Islands, carrying six passengers and a large quantity of mail and express. On the return trip mail and express as well as four passengers were taken here. At nine o'clock in the morning Pilot H. S. Jones left Charlottetown with three passengers and a quantity of mail and express for the Gulf Islands. Shortly after noon he made his second trip there with approximately 400 pounds of mail and express, but no passengers. At 8:20 a.m. Pilot Carl Burke left with three passengers as well as express and mail for the Magdalens. Both morning trips resulted in the transportation of 800 pounds of mail and 370 pounds of express. Trips were not made to the islands for several days owing to poor flying conditions and as a result much mail and express accumulated, but this congestion was relieved by yesterday's trips.
