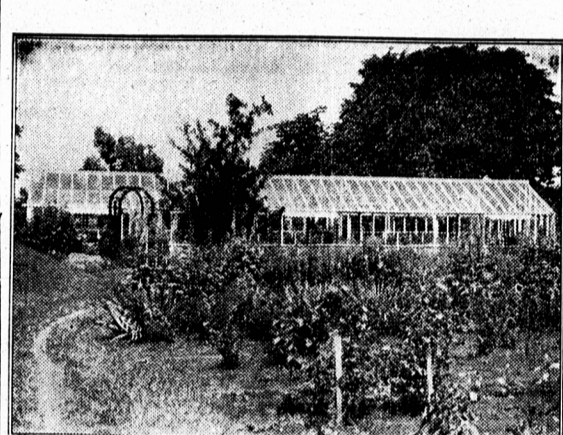

Response of Crops To Manure

(Experimental Farms News)
That different crops respond in varying measure to the application of manure is a well recognized fact. A knowledge of how they respond is necessary if the most profitable returns are to be obtained from the manure and from the crops in the rotation as a whole.

Where intertilled crops are grown, they will perhaps show the most profitable response, but where rotations consist of grain and hay the answer to the question is not so obvious.

With rotations on heavy clay soils such as are found in Northern Ontario, the results of an experiment at the Dominion Experimental Station at Kapuskasing, Ontario are very instructive.

Two similar four-year rotations have been running alongside each other for thirteen years. Both consist of oats, barley and two years of mixed hay. One has not received any manure or other fertilizer, while the other has been given an application of eight tons of manure to the barley and another of eight tons on the aftermath of the first year of hay from the second year of hay. From the information gathered on these rotations during thirteen years, it is possible to compare the effect of manure on barley and hay, and the residual effect on oats and hay.

A study of the data shows that barley increased 65 per cent and hay 126 per cent in response to direct applications of manure, while oats increased 60 per cent

These comparisons show very clearly that the hay crops responded in a greater degree to manure than did the grain crops, and indicate that the most profitable place for the manure will be on the hay crop.

Another experiment that has been running for a shorter time seems to indicate that commercial fertilizers will give as good results on grain as on hay.

It would appear then that the most satisfactory results will be obtained from applying the manure on the hay crop, and the commercial fertilizers on the grain crops.

KENSINGTON PALACE BELOVED BY BRITISH
"Near the roof of Kensington High Street sleeps a Palace where Time itself seems to stand still," says Wynne Garrett, writing in "Women's Journal." It is the beloved Palace, loved in by many generations of royalty and still the home today of three Princesses.

"I love every brick of the place," these words are often on the lips of Kensington Palace residents as they stand in the little courtyards of what might be an unspooled Stuart village. The Palace has its cottages and green as well as its royal residences. Queen Victoria cherished it so much that she would not hear of its being pulled down to make way for the growth of London. So Parliament restored it at great cost for her Diamond Jubilee. "Never before" it was declared, "has the restoration of any

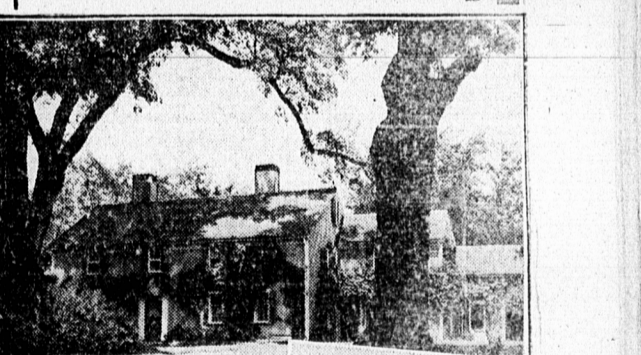
historic building been carried out with quite the same loving care." "Many ancestral houses but few Palaces have excited so much affection. People visualise a Palace as a cross between a West End hotel, a museum, and a summer house. Not the sort of place to make a home in."

"The secret of Kensington Palace is its homeliness. That little understood monarch, William III, at least knew how to build something friendly and comfortable. He got Sir Christopher Wren to enlarge the existing house, designing it as near as possible to Dutch homes that the King had known. When our own Queen Mary was born in 1867 in the first-floor bedroom which had been Queen Victoria's looking on to Kensington Gardens, not one chimney was visible from the windows."

"To-day, after seventy-one years of London's development, still only one roof top, that of a distant Park Lane Hotel, is to be seen from this room. The vista is that of the silver sheet of the Round Pond and the far-stretching grass-way lined by trees."

The SNAPSHOT GUILD PICTURING THE HOUSE



Careful "framing" with trees made this snapshot more pleasing.

ALMOST everyone who has a camera takes pictures of his home, but many of us neglect the few simple suggestions which would make our snapshots of "home sweet home" much more pleasing. Here they are:

First, keep the camera level, or vertical lines will be distorted. Stand back far enough to get the picture without tilting the camera. If necessary, shoot from across the street—perch yourself in a fork of a tree, or maybe a step-ladder will give you the proper elevation.

Second, pick a time when the sun lights the house at the proper angle. The sun rays should strike the house at a slant so that shadows are cast by such details as window frames and weatherboarding. These shadows outline all the brightly lighted projecting details, and they will appear clearly in the picture.

Third, try to "frame" the picture attractively with trees or overhanging branches. Such a natural "frame" for the house gives depth to the picture and adds pictorial charm.

A good fourth rule—use a color filter over the camera lens to give tone to the sky. Rich-toned sky is especially pleasing in pictures of white houses, and it improves the effect of any picture.

If you have no recent pictures of your home, take a few today, following these suggestions. Perhaps your house is so situated that you can't apply all the rules, but each, by itself, will help you produce pictures that more attractively present the place where you live.
