HORSE NOTES

Good progress is reported in the 2:30 Island bred stake.

The two year old trotters are beating 2:30 down in Geologie.

The \$1000 purses for the June meetings in Rockport and Cranwood failed to fill.

Fred Egan, the Colorado trainer, is coming east again with Braden Direct, 2:01 1/2.

Earl Jr., 2:01 1/2, is entered in the free-for-all pace at the Kalamazoo Grand Circuit Meeting.

The first Canadian race meeting this year will be held at Dufferin Park, Toronto, April 21 and 22.

Charlottetown will now be in the Maritime racing circuit this year despite announcements previous to the contrary.

Will Fleming is to train Joe Patchen L. 2:03 1/2. It was Fleming who got along so well with the "big train" four years ago.

Orwell Belle is now owned in Montague, "Gaz" Ellis having purchased the mare from Frank McNair of Summerside the other day.

There will likely be the usual Dominion Day races at Summerside this coming season. There will also be the usual fall fair races.

Bonnie Boy 2:07 1/2, campaigned by Guy Lee of Union City, Tenn., has started in 66 races during the last six years, winning 26 firsts, 23 seconds, nine thirds, two fourths and six times unplaced. His winnings total \$9,491.

There will be the usual King's Birthday races on the Charlottetown Driving Park. The programme has not yet been decided on, but it will likely include in a free-for-all, a 2:30 pace and a 2:40 trot.

The usual matinee races under the auspices of the Charlottetown Driving Club will be held the coming season. Last years races under the same auspices were most successful.

There will be the usual races at Charlottetown in connection with the fall fair. The exhibition dates are September 28-29, and there will be racing each day.

Two pacers, famous along the Pacific coast, will meet in a \$5,000 match race this summer. They are Hal Boy a gelding, and White Sox, a famous mare. The pair have met twice before, and honors are even.

Sons of Bingen, 2:06 1/2, sired 134 standard performers in 1915. McKinney 2:13, stands second in this respect, with fifty-eight, while Axworthy, 2:15 1/2, and Peter the Great, 2:07 1/2, stand third and fourth, with fifty-four and fifty, respectively.

The death of Chantant, 2:12 1/2, which occurred some time ago has just been reported, and it is said that the noted sire actually died from starvation. The son of Wilkes Boy 2:24 1/2, has sired eighty-seven standard performers, six sons that have sired sixty-nine horses with records, and twenty-five daughters that have thirty-six in the list.

The race of February 23rd was the biggest ice-racing event ever held on the island, a special train with four horses coming out from Charlottetown and Summerside was represented with three horses and a very large number of "fans." The Guardian is in receipt of three photographs of this race, and

the horses racing, and are satisfied that the reports of the vast crowds and the good course etc., were correct in the interest of the horse and good sport it is to be hoped that this club will be in the foreground next winter.

A resume of the past winter's racing shows that the New London Driving Club, led the Province both in number of day's racing, and in attendance. According to the reports sent in there were five days of racing, and twelve classes, and the sum of \$160.00 was put

up in purses and premiums, and they have a total of one hundred and twenty-five members. This club was promoted and has been conducted on the roughly business lines and the management are to be congratulated on having had such a successful winter's sport in the face of the difficulties in connection with holding races the past season.
