Hawks Earlier Bid For Deal With Habs Flopped

MONTREAL, Oct. 30 (CP)—There's a lot of smoke going around the National Hockey League circuit over Chicago Black Hawks' plight, but there's no fire at Montreal Forum for the very good reason that the trade-minded Hawks themselves put it out.

Crises of anguish have come from president Bill Tobin and coach Johnny Gottselig that the other clubs are giving the Hawks the business and won't let good defencemen, now down in the minors with stout strings attached, move up to the practically defenceless Hawks.

Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens have been the principal targets of the Chicago blasts. From Canadiens the Hawks would like to get Hal Laycoe, now playing defence with Buffalo of the American Hockey League.

During the training season, said Canadiens' general manager Frank Selke today, Chicago failed to continue negotiations that still left a Laycoe deal open. Then, with the Hawks' situation becoming increasingly desperate, Chicago made a ridiculous offer involving cash and one or two untried defencemen.

And back in the summer Hawks "consistently refused" to consider Frankie Edolfs, who was later traded to New York Rangers.

From the Hawk training camp came a wire asking "which defenceman we might consider in a deal for Alex Kaleta."

The gist of the reply was:

1. Butch Bouchard and Kenny Redmond are Canadiens' mainstay defencemen, as well as being all-star selections. No deal.
2. Glen Harmon is in business in Montreal and wouldn't consider playing elsewhere even if Canadiens were willing to give him up which they were not anxious to do.
3. Roger Leger, hitting his stride in his sophomore year, is a French-Canadian and the club figured his logical place now is with Canadiens.
4. Doug Harvey, making his N.H.L. debut, is a local boy who was star of Montreal Royals' Canadian amateur champions and should have his chance in his home town to make good.
5. Hal Laycoe was deal material for Alex Kaleta but there would have to be "other arrangements."

The Hawks ignored this message until the season was a few games old and then came the "ridiculous offer."

In view of this and the previous refusal of Detroit, Selke felt "the blame, if any, must lie on Chicago's own doorstep."

"Anyway," said Selke, "hockey's rivalry is best maintained when each team looks strictly after its own strength."

Harridge Gets Into Dispute Over White Sox Suspension

CHICAGO, Oct. 30 (AP)—President Will Harridge of the American League today projected his organization into the controversy raging between A. B. Chandler, Commissioner of baseball, the Chicago White Sox and Leslie O'Connor, suspended general manager of the Sox.

Harridge called a meeting of League club owners, or their representatives, to be held in Cleveland tomorrow to "consider the action taken against the White Sox and O'Connor."

Harridge revealed that Chandler had requested the removal of O'Connor from baseball's executive council presumably because Chandler was of the opinion that since O'Connor remains under suspension he could not serve.

The Council is composed of Chandler, Warren G. Giles, general manager of the Cincinnati Club, and the presidents of the American and National Leagues, Harridge and Ford Frick.

O'Connor will attend tomorrow's meeting to explain his side of the controversy and to exhibit correspondence that passed between himself and Chandler over the signing of an obscure 17-year-old Chicago high school boy pitcher, George Zoeterman.

The signing resulted in a \$500 fine and later suspension of O'Connor and the White Sox because of O'Connor's refusal to remit on the plea that he had not violated any rule.

Zoeterman, promising left handed pitcher, signed to a 1948 contract after he had served as a batting practice pitcher with the White Sox on their last eastern trip. Zoeterman pitched four no hit games in the last two years.

Baseball rules specially provide that students in high schools belonging to the National Federation of High School Athletic Associations may not be signed until after graduation, or until after their class has graduated. Zoeterman will not be graduated until next January.

Chandler declared Zoeterman's contract void and fined O'Connor \$500.

In declining to pay the fine, O'Connor pointed out that Chicago Christian, a private school which Zoeterman attends, does not belong to the National Federation.

When O'Connor noted that Chandler had broadened the rule to cover all high school students in the United States and Canada O'Connor insisted the rule must be applied as written and that Chandler had exceeded his rights in expanding the interpretation.

The ban prohibits the White Sox and O'Connor from taking any part in the major league draft to be held in Cincinnati Nov. 10 or from having any representatives at the executive council sessions and joint meetings of the major leagues.

However, O'Connor today announced the signing of his star shortstop Luke Appling, Appling, 1943 American League batting champion, will be starting his eighteenth season with the White Sox. He had an unofficial batting average of .306 last season.
