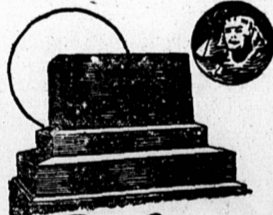

—REBUILDING AFTER FIRE—Mr. Andre Paturel, whose extensive and splendidly equipped lobster cannery on the Queen's wharf, Summerside, was recently destroyed by fire, lost no time in starting to rebuild. His new factory, which is now about half completed, but will not be ready for three times as large as the old factory and will be even better and more modernly equipped. Since the fire, Mr. Napoleon Arsenault of Mont Carmel, has been packing for Mr. Paturel, but the latter has fixed up temporary quarters and will do the canning himself next week. At the close of the lobster season, Mr. Paturel will be extensively engaged in the shipment of smelts to the Boston and other markets. He has had an exceptionally busy season, especially with live lobsters, an industry which is rapidly expanding. Owing to the rough weather during the past week his shipments have fallen off somewhat although up to the present he has shipped eighteen thousand pounds of live lobsters to the Boston market this week.—S.

IMPORTS OVER EXPORTS

NEARLY \$44,000,000 C. T. AWA, Ont., Oct. 8.—Canada's total trade for the first quarter of the current fiscal year amounted to \$226,164,054, an increase from \$222,647,859 for the corresponding period last year. This is shown in the quarterly report issued today by the Department of Trade and Commerce. For the three months imports into Canada exceeded exports by \$43,999,632. Imports totalled \$335,081,843, as compared with \$291,082,211 in exports.
