SHOOTING AFFAIR STILL A MYSTERY

Police Inclined To Believe Father's Story That He Shot Son Accidentally.

The condition of Frank Vessey, victim of a mysterious shooting accident Sunday night, who now lies in the Charlottetown Hospital, was reported somewhat improved last night. Vessey himself gave little information concerning the affair, only briefly stating he had shot himself. Early yesterday afternoon, however, Michael Vessey, father of Frank, confessed to the police that his son was shot at their residence, 84 Powne Street, in a quarrel over a revolver. Michael, who is crippled, said that while he was in bed a quarrel arose over the possession of a revolver in a struggle taking place at the foot of the bed, he accidentally pulled the trigger, and the bullet struck Frank in the right chest. The bullet must have been fired from an elevation, for at the hospital three x-rays showed the bullet near the kidneys at the base of the spine.

Michael said that he and his son were the only ones present at the time of the shooting, but that Spurgeon Diamond and Walter Duffy, who arrived shortly afterwards, took the wounded man to the City Hospital. The police are investigating the matter. A strange feature of the case is the fact that the revolver which fired the bullet has not yet been found.

At The S' Side Police Court

SUMMERSIDE, Aug. 18.—The adjourned hearing of a case against Joseph McDougall, accused of stealing foxes from the ranch of Alban Strong, came up for hearing this morning in the Summerside Police Court and occupied the attention of the Court all day. Policeman Linkletter, was the first witness examined and testified that he went with Constable Platts, accompanied by Alban Strong to execute a search warrant for the foxes said to be stolen. Mr. Strong gave them a description of the foxes he had lost, and on going to the ranch of Patrick Delaney, Linkletter Road, certain foxes in a pen in the ranch were identified by Mr. Strong as the ones he had lost. They were taken by the officers under the search warrant and placed by order of the Magistrate issuing the warrant in Mr. Ray Tanton's ranch.

Mrs. Delaney was the next witness, who testified that she was present at Fred Pritchard's premises when the accused came along with the foxes in a bag, and heard the bargain and sale take place between he and Pritchard. The foxes were then taken over to her ranch, and the foxes taken by the officers were the same pups as sold by the accused to Pritchard.

Fred Pritchard, next witness, who under the protection of the Court, corroborated the statements made by Mrs. Delaney as to the sale of the foxes to him. The third witness, Wesley Heckbert, who was well acquainted with the accused, stated that about a week before the foxes were taken from Strong's ranch, he with some others in conversation

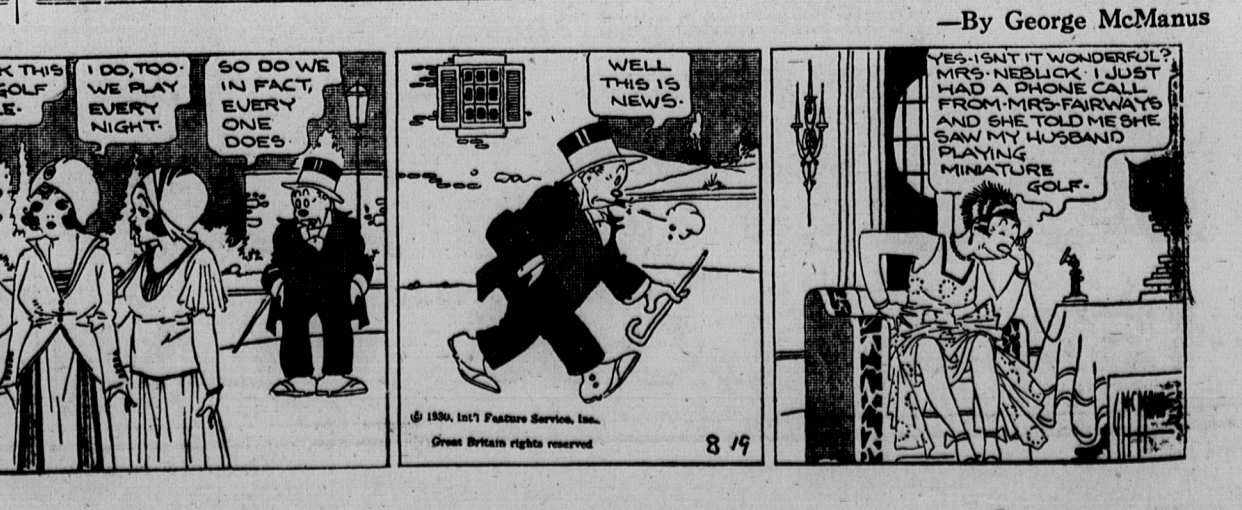

End Of Civil War In China Predicted

 NANKING, Aug. 18.—Sweeping claims of victory on the battlefields of northern China caused high Government circles today to predict the end of the civil war on terms dictated by the Nanking regime. The optimistic forecast was made as the result of the recapture by Nationalists of Tsinan, Capital of Shantung Province and reports indicating northern rebel armies in Honan Province were finding Government fire too hot to withstand. Boil gently 1 cupful granulated sugar and ¼ cupful water until it thickens.
