MAINE, P. E. I. AND N. B. HORSES WIN AT ST. STEPHEN

ST. STEPHEN, Sept. 15.—This was the first day of the racing in connection with the Exhibition, and Maine, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island produced the winners. In the 220 trot, Seldom C., who was raised in St. Stephen, came back to her own home town and guided by her owner, Tom Holmes, came through a winner after Eileen Aubrey had taken the first heat. It seemed today as though horses once owned here wanted to show their old owners that they had made a mistake in disposing of them, for in the 230 mixed, Marge Direct, brought here as a colt by Aubrey Johnston, of this town, and trained and driven by Billy Keyes, as a three-year-old and now owned by Dr. Dugan of Charlottetown, and driven by Peter Conroy, had it over his field today and won in straight heats.

This was a great day for the long shots for not a favorite came through. In the 2.11 class Kinney Silk, the favorite, could only land fourth,

U. S. WIN AT POLO FROM BRITISH FOUR

WESTBURY, N. Y., Sept. 15.—The United States "Big Four" again reigned supreme in the world of polo, but only after the most spirited challenge they have ever had.

In a close and fiercely fought battle this afternoon on the green turf of the Meadowbrook Club, the United States four horsemen checked Great Britain's thrilling comeback to win the second and third games of the International Cup Series by a score of 5-3.

GAINED IN FIRST PERIOD
The margin of triumph was gained in the first period, when the brilliant young United States forward, Tommy Hitchcock, scored three sensational goals in succession, but it took all of the defensive skill of the Yankees to hold their margin against the spirited attack of the re-organized British team.

Throughout the last seven periods the Britons immeasurably strengthened by the addition of the hard-driving captain, George Denning, to the forward line, fought the Americans to a standstill in a battle that contrasted sharply with their rout in the opening game last Saturday.

Hectic Contest Witnessed By 700 Ball Fans At Moncton

MONCTON, Sept. 15.—By defeating Campbellton by a 6 to 5 score here today, the C. N. R. C. baseball team of this city, tied up the semi-final series leading to the New Brunswick amateur championship. The deciding game will be played tomorrow.

Today's game was one of the most hectic struggles seen here this season and was witnessed by some 700 fans. Costly errors were in evidence and occurred frequently, twelve being marked against both teams, the visitors having seven notched up against them. It was these that caused the defeat of the North Shore squad, although both teams were very evenly matched.

The visitors drew first blood, hanging up two in the first stanza and the C. N. R. C. threw away an opportunity to tie the score in their half of the opening inning.

The locals scored three runs in the fourth frame and jumped into the lead, but this did not last long, for Campbellton came back strong in the fifth and put over three runs, giving them a lead of one.

Canadians Beaten At Forest Hills

FOREST HILLS, N. Y., Sept. 15.—Jack Wright, Canadian tennis champion, was defeated in his third round of the United States men's singles championship here this afternoon by Little Bill Johnston, of California.

Johnston's powerful forehand, improving steadily in control, enabled him to eliminate the last of the Canadian players in the tournament. The scores were 6-4, 6-4, 6-4. The little California was hitting the ball with his old-time pace and precision and led the Canadian Davis Cup star from the start.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—The Pittsburgh Pirates' lead in the National League was advanced to four games today when they bested both ends of a double-header from Boston on their home grounds, 6-2, and 3-0. The Braves now have lost 10 straight and the Pirates won seven straight.

Neither the New York Giants nor the St. Louis Cardinals, in second place, made any headway, as they divided a double-header Cardinals winning the first, 6 to 3, in 10 innings, and the Giants the second, 9 to 3, at St. Louis.

Chicago fell six and one-half games behind the Pirates when they were trounced by Brooklyn at Chicago, 10 to 6.
