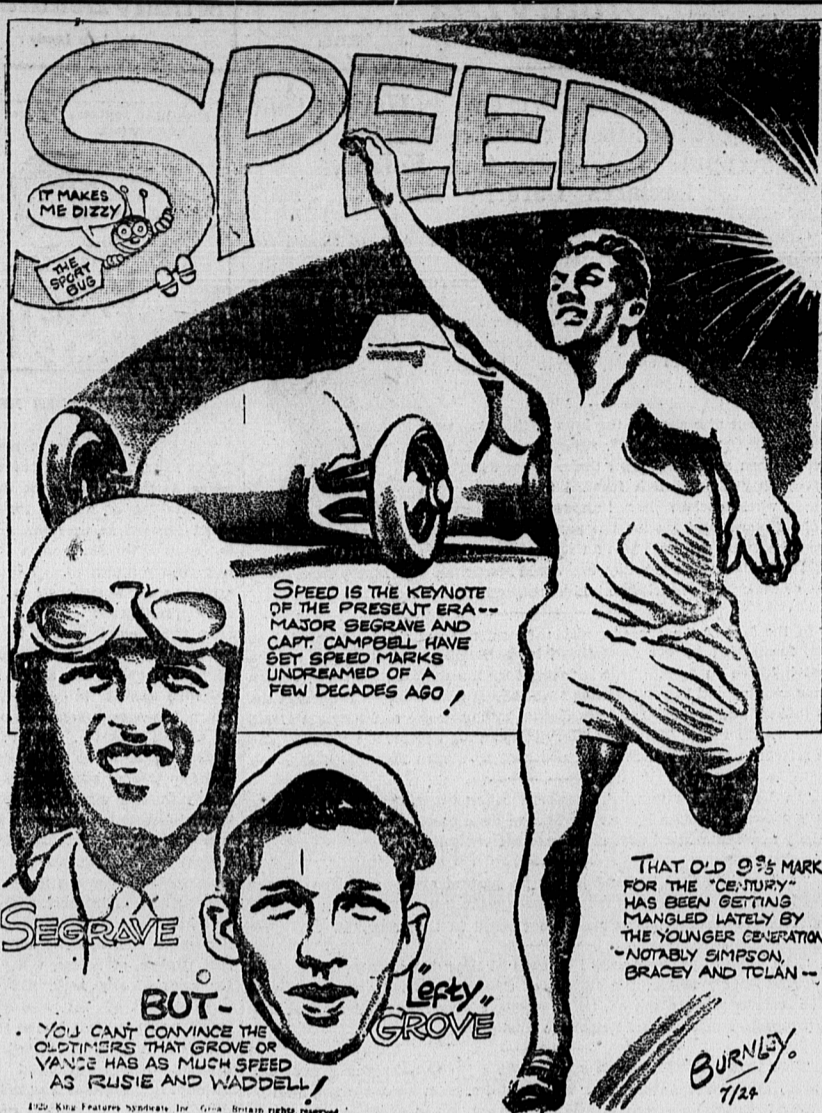

Speed in sport? Why, they're even trying to inject it into chess nowadays, according to Mr. George Timpon, the New York Newspaper Club authority on that game! There's a proposal to limit the masters to fifteen, instead of twenty, minutes an average move. Speeding up the wrestlers, if that be possible, will come next, no doubt.
 As for the sports activities that demand speed primarily, never has there been such intensive effort to shatter all former records.
 George Simpson, Ohio State flash, gave the world its biggest athletic thrill in generations when he did the 100-yard dash in 9 2-5 seconds, clipping that "impossible fifth" from the old word record. Bracey, Tolan and almost a dozen other exceptional college sprinters are right on Simpson's heels.
 Though expert knowledge of the

human physique decries a 9-second 100-yard dash as an utter impossibility, such opinion will not retard the attempts to achieve that on the part of our human antelopes. Simpson strained one of his legs in setting that 9 2-5 mark. And none will be surprised if the speedster, who eventually does the 100 in 9 1-5, hurts both legs! Should anyone ever achieve it in 9 seconds flat, he will be a most extraordinary physical freak.
 Yet most of the normal sprinters will keep on trying and trying to lengthen their final stride to the necessary eyelash length which would split in time the elusive fraction separating 9 2-5 from that "impossible" 9 seconds flat.
 Of all the human speedsters, the public is most anxious to see the baseball pitchers sizzle 'em across. Ask any big league fan who has the fastest ball today and the majority will name "Lefty" Grove of the Philadelphia Athletics, though a

strong minority contends that "Dazzy" Vance of Brooklyn is still the steam king of old. When one weighs the fact that canny Connie Mack, who once had "Rube" Waddell thinks Grove has even more speed through the innings than the most eccentric and historic of his southpaw riffs, a neutral judge may decide that "Lefty" is probably the speediest of 1929 pitchers.
 When it comes to the motors that whiz cars and boats through space with dazzling celerity, the names Segrave, Campbell and Gar Wood symbolize speed itself in this age.
 Baseball's "lively ball" also may be considered as evidence of the public's demand for speed and—
 Even the 6-day bike racers have been indulging in lap-stealing rampages of late.
 "But why bring that up?" as Mr. Moran might say to Mr. Mack while carving the name "Speed" on the shell of his pet racing turtle!

LEO DIEGEL WINS CANADIAN GOLF CH,SHIP

 MONTREAL, Que., July 28 — Leo Diegel, of Agua Caliente, Mexico, yesterday won the Canadian Open Golf championship for the fourth time in the last six years by compiling a 72 hole score of 274, the lowest total for four, 18 holes rounds that has ever been achieved in the Dominion tournament.
 Diegel was tied with Tommy Armour, Detroit professional with 208 at the end of yesterday morning's 18 holes, which marked the conclusion of 45 holes of the 72 hole title round, but in the final 18 in the afternoon, Diegel clipped four strokes from par for a 66, as against Armour's 69, which was one under par. Armour's 72 hole total was 277, a score which placed him comfortably in second place.
 MacDonald Smith, New York, Canadian Open Champion in 1926, Joe Kirkwood, Chicago and Bill Melhorn, New York, finished in a tie for third place, each scoring 284 for the 72 holes. Smith played some great golf yesterday getting a 67 in the morning and a 70 in the afternoon to equal Diegel's 137 for the final 36 holes, his 147 for the first two rounds, however, ruined his title chances. Jim Barnes of New Rochelle, New York, Thursday's leader with his record breaking 66, got two 73's yesterday and finished in sixth place with a total of 287.
