MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.

(Continued from page 1.)

by eloquent and forceful presentation of arguments by men trained in the art of sending arguments home. The Anti-Union advocates were Reverends P. F. Fullerton, D. Wright, D. McKenzie, Wood Islands, A. Beaton, Caledonia; A. Craize, West River and Mr. T. C. James, Charlottetown.

The speakers in favor of union were Reverends R. G. Strathie, John Gillis, Robert Murray, O'Leary; R. G. Sinclair, Tyne Valley; D. Fraser, Montague, M. N. McLeod, Dundas; W. H. Spencer, Covehead; A. J. McNeill, Murray River; M. H. McInnis, McLeod, Souris, Lt. Governor Rogers, Messrs. D. N. Forbes and J. J. McLeod.

Rev. Mr. Fullerton closed the debate. The vote stood 41 to 7 in favour of Mr. Strathie's amendment, approving of the basis of union.

An amendment moved by Mr. James that the final vote be not taken now but in March next, after the questions had been submitted to the sessions and congregations was defeated in the same division. The chief points in favor of the basis of union, as set forth by Mr. Strathie and others were as follows: That the Union Movement is backed up by the names of some of the great leaders of the church, such as the late Principal Caven, the late Principal McLaren, the late Principal Grant, Dr. Pollock, Dr. Patrick, Dr. Gordon and others.

That Church Union means a great saving of men, of labor, of time, of money, saves the respect of church workers, and obviates the open scandal of rivalry.

That whatever difficulties may be found in the Basis of Union, no one of the negotiating churches is perfect now, and in some respects each church labors under harsh methods that soon may have to be changed. Christ demanded that the efforts of Christian people be directed towards reaching a union, one in spirit, one in aim, one in temper, one in antagonism to a common foe. The logical outcome of a movement pushed forward by this spirit is organic movement. Every Presbyterian is loyal to his

church and respects his church's history. Union does not mean that Presbyterianism is loved less but the good of the Kingdom of God is loved more.

The basis of union is the result of the most careful and mature deliberation of a large body of the best men from the three negotiating churches, Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists, covering some eight years of discussion.

The Anti-Unionists under the leadership of Rev. Mr. Fullerton contended:

- (1) Union was not inculcated by Jesus Christ. (2) Christianity insists on individuality and on union through diversity. (3) Presbyterian categories of the Ministry are identical with those found in the early Christian Church. (4) We sacrifice our heritage secured to us by the shedding of blood our special privilege and our high position in Christendom for a purely hypothetical good. (5) We can do more for public morals by remaining as we are than by entering union. (6) We lose our identity and cut ourselves off from our past history.

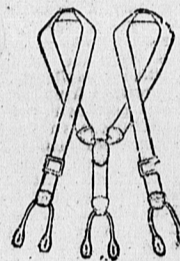

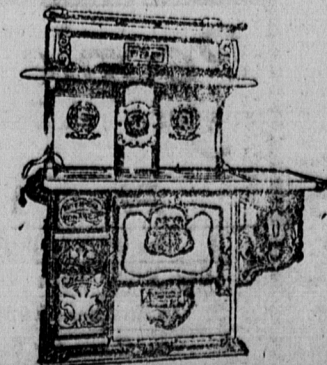
