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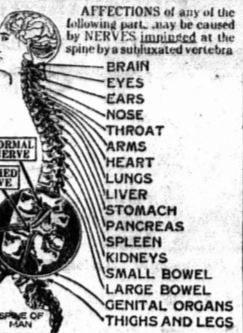

Judicature of the Province of P. E. I. The grand jurors summoned to attend the assize of this honourable court at this June term beg me to report as follows: In harmony with the instructions received from this honourable court, constables and fence viewers have been appointed for this year. We have visited the jail and commend highly the repairs made on the building up to the present time and all would recommend that the good work be continued. We find the rooms in the basement require to be thoroughly whitened and the ceiling in several places plastered. We would further recommend that a suitable stove and pipe be secured for the basement and that on all occasions when prisoners are incarcerated during either spring or autumn that the basement be heated from the furnace as at present it is so damp it is not fit for human habitation when the weather is wet.

On the second floor we would recommend that the registry office be redecorated, a light of glass obtained for window and new sash cord for all the windows, and that the vault be thoroughly cleansed as we do not consider that it is in a sanitary condition, there are many old documents that are damp and musty and some method must be made to disinfect these documents and place the vault in proper shape. Also that new window blinds be secured for all of the offices and court rooms.

We would recommend further that both the ceiling and floor of the court room be painted. We find the sheriff's room requires to be decorated and placed in proper shape. Also the stipendiary magistrate's rooms. The deputy prothonotary's office needs to be painted and renovated and your grand jurors believe that a reasonable sum should be appropriated each year for the necessary repairs on our public offices.

We would recommend that the prisoners incarcerated in the Prince County Jail, from our observation apparently, are bodied men, but for the fact we commend the jailer for the faithful discharge of his duties and the laudable efforts he is making to have things in proper shape. The grounds and approach to the building are all that could be desired. The wash room ceiling needs to be replastered, and some other minor repairs are needed which we trust will be attended to at once. All of which is respectfully submitted.

BY LAWS PASSED YESTERDAY

Three New By-Laws Enacted by the City Council—One Deals With Restaurants, Another With Gasoline Vendors, and a Third With Vehicular Traffic in the City.

The following is a summary of the by laws which passed their third reading at a meeting of the City Council yesterday morning.

A BY LAW RESPECTING RETAIL VENDORS OF GASOLINE
(a) After the passing of the by-law all retail vendors of gasoline must take out a license. These will be issued by the City Clerk, and must be renewed yearly. The license fee depends on the number of pumps at each filling station. The charge will be fifty dollars for the first pump; thirty dollars for the second pump, and twenty dollars for each pump installed after the second.

(b) The penalty for an infraction of the by-law is a fine not to exceed fifty dollars, or imprisonment for a period not greater than ninety days.

(c) There is a provision empowering the Mayor and the Chairman of the Finance Committee, or the City Council to refuse at their discretion, for good reason, (such as an endeavour to open a filling station in a residential district) to refuse a license. They may also cancel any license after issue, if the licensee is operated in such a manner as to endanger the safety of persons or property, or to impede traffic.

A BY LAW TO REGULATE RESTAURANTS
(a) After the passage of the by-law, all restaurants must be licensed. The licenses are to be issued by the City Clerk on the order of the Mayor and Chairman of the Police Committee or the City Council. The cost of the license is \$5.00 and the license must be renewed annually, or on change of ownership of the restaurant.

(b) No license will be granted until the applicant has satisfied the authorities that the premises are clean and sanitary and fitted for use as a restaurant. Further, the employees must be of good moral character, and free from any loathsome, contagious or infectious disease.

(c) Stalls, private rooms for guests, and screens are forbidden in restaurants.

(d) The Police Officer and the City Medical Health Officer shall have the right to examine the premises and the Medical Health Officer the persons of all employed in the business. Penalty for refusal is revocation of the license.

(e) Restaurants may not be open for, or do business, except on the following hours:
On Sundays (for meals only) between 8.30 a. m. and 10.00 a. m., 12.00 noon and 2.00 p. m.; and 5.30 p. m. and 7.00 p. m.
On Week Days—Between 6.00 a. m. and 1.00 a. m. of the following day, except on Saturdays, when they must close at midnight.

(f) Licenses may be revoked by the authorities or restored on such conditions as they deem necessary.

(g) The penalty for heed of the by-laws is a fine not to exceed fifty dollars, or imprisonment for not more than ninety days.

(h) For a banquet, or other special occasion, the Mayor may give permission to a restaurant to be open at hours other than those set forth above.

A BY LAW TO REGULATE THE TRAFFIC IN THE CITY OF CHARLOTTETOWN

Vehicles requiring to cross from one side of the street to the other must do so at the intersection of streets only.

No vehicle shall be parked so as to obstruct traffic.

There shall be no parking on any street nearer than 25 feet from the curb line or prolongation of an intersecting street nor nearer than six feet from any foot crossing.

The speed limit for cars is increased from 12 to 15 miles per hour.

The speed limit for crossing intersecting streets is 10 miles per hour.

All vehicles approaching the point of junction of Euston Street with Great George and Elm Avenue shall come to a full stop immediately behind or short of the nearer line of sidewalk, or foot crossing or behind such other line as may be marked as a stop line.

All vehicles operated on Spring Park Road, approaching its junction with Euston Street, shall before crossing or entering upon Euston Street come to a full stop, in the places mentioned above.

All vehicles operated on Upper Prince Street, approaching its junction with Euston Street, shall stop as aforesaid.
