## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

ALMSGIVING AND PRAYER.

February 6.

Matthew 6:1-15.

GOLDEN TEXT.

"Take heed that ye do not your righteousness before men, to be seen of them."—Matt. 6:1 (R. V.).

POINTED SUGGESTIONS.

By Rev. D. W. Snider.

The first great lesson for those to learn who would attain to Christian perfection—which is the demand laid upon every disciple of Jesus, and by which they may express the mind of God, which has already been revealed as their example—is that it does not consist in outward and showy religious and benevolent exercises. With the devout Jew this was the tendency. His devotion, he felt must be manifest to outward show of it. The hypocrite repeats this tendency into a parade of piety which was vain glorious and offensive.

It is never hard for those who go about it, to find ways and means of drawing attention to themselves. A common course to pursue is that of perversion—the putting into selfish and wrong uses those things which have been designed for other and right purposes. An alms box, with a trumpet-shaped opening, will become a trumpet. Its receipt of alms will be incidental to a noisy and pompous affectation of piety.

Slumdom finds fault very partly with many who call themselves workers and visitors in the slum sections or wards of great cities. The reason, doubtless, is that so many of them fail to remember or do not know, or are, by reason of their hypocrisy, careless of the fact that alms working and almsgiving are not matters of piety or commiseration, but of righteousness. The emotion of pity need not be absent from the worker of righteousness, but the one who feels that he is only and merely doing his duty will not manifest in his hearing the offence either of curiosity or patronage.

## Synopsis of Canadian North West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or who has a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the intending homesteader.

Entries—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
