Meeting of Women's Patriotic Association

A meeting of the C. W. P. A. was held in the Provincial Building Thursday Feb. 27th. The President Mrs. F. L. Hazard in the chair.

The Secretary read the report of all work that had been done, and all contributions received by the society since the inception of the work in Aug 1914, till the present time. As all the work is not yet in, a full list will be published later. The treasurer's receipts were \$7598.57 expenditure \$7487.40, leaving a balance of \$111.17. Moved by Mrs. George Robertson, seconded by Mrs. John McLeod that this balance be given to the Canadian Red Cross Society. Carried.

Moved by Mrs. John McLeod, seconded by Mrs. A. Ross that a special vote of thanks be offered to Mrs. Charles Lyons, Mrs. George Robertson and Mrs. Melike. Carried.

Before the meeting closed Mrs. Hazard was presented with an address, a work table and gold thimble by Mrs. John McLeod on behalf of the members in token of their appreciation of her untiring services.

In reply Mrs. Hazard thanked the members for the gift and for the ready assistance given her by them. The meeting then adjourned.

NATIONAL POULTRY CONFERENCE.

The poultry industry of Canada has made such progress that a Dominion poultry conference was held at Ottawa on February 18th, 19th 20th.

The object of the conference was to unite the various poultry interests throughout the Dominion into a national body.

The official delegates from Prince Edward Island were Rev. P. C. Gauthier, Mr. John E. Sinclair, M. P., Mr. E. T. Bulpitt and Mr. Wm. Kerr.

Mr. Kerr outlined the work that had been accomplished during recent years. He stated that "Quality Payment" has made the poultry industry on the Island "Good goods to good customers" was the secret of success. The speaker pointed out that Prince Edward Island organizations were planning with a national viewpoint and that Island people were building not for the Island interests only but for a bigger Canada.

Mr. Bulpitt reported for the Prince Edward Island Egg & Poultry Association. He laid stress on the value of organization, and the value of quality payment in the development of the egg industry. Mr. Bulpitt told of the Association's work and progress and of the value of its precedent in the development of other industries. Unity of purpose, and organization would do wonders for any line of agriculture.

Mr. Sinclair gave an able address on "Economic production through stock improvement". In his remarks Mr. Sinclair pointed out that what was still a theory in many places had been an accomplished fact for some time on

Prince Edward Island. To get results from poultry, the producer must be shown a profit. Co-operation in marketing had shown that "profit" on Prince Edward Island and had given the Province a name and reputation on every market where our eggs were to be found. As a result more and better poultry was being kept, and better housing and better management were being practised. An inspection service had been installed under the supervision of federal officers. By this means farmers were able to have their flocks culled by experts and hundreds of "bearders" that were a source of loss were slaughtered. This service was obtainable by anyone sending a written application to the department.

Rev. P. C. Gauthier was present by special request. The Doctor's eloquent appeal for broader vision and cleaner national institutions was received with enthusiasm. In a short address that was crammed with facts the Doctor in his eloquent style summarized the whole situation. He paid a tribute to the gallant soldiers now returning and called upon the delegates to return to their several Provinces with determination to enlarge the Canadian vision and hold up the Canadian ideal. Our vision should be wider than the continent and our ideal should be "quality" first in our manhood then in the goods we as farmers offer on the markets of the world.

A feature of the conference was the presence of our four federal members. This is a unique record and was specially mentioned. Messrs. Nicholson, Melissac, Sinclair and Capt. Read have shown their interest in their province, and are alive to the interests of the farming community.

An outcome of the conference was the formation of a National Poultry Council.
