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CONSERVATIVE LEADER AND COLLEAGUE WERE ENTHUSIASTICALLY GREETED AT ST. GEORGE'S

It Might Have Been a Conservative Party Rally, Rather than a Joint Political Meeting, from the Cordial Reception Tendered Messrs. J. D. Stewart and J. H. McDonald, but the Liberal Candidates were all Alone and did not Manage Even to Stick Together, Mr. Knight Deserting Mr. Hessian at the Last Moment, and Pleading Only for Himself.

The cordial and enthusiastic reception given the Conservative leader, Mr. J. D. Stewart and his colleague, Mr. J. Howard McDonald, at the joint political meeting at St. George's on Friday night must have been gratifying to them, as it was to all their friends and supporters. The applause with which they were greeted was an overwhelming tribute to their popularity and the meeting could not have been any stronger for the Conservative cause had it been purely a party rally. The Liberal candidates received a frosty reception which declined from zero to considerably below freezing point as the meeting progressed. Mr. Stewart in his able speech fully covered the matters at issue in the present election and was followed with the closest attention. To the frequent and irrelevant interruptions of Mr. S. S. Hessian he replied in the courteous manner which has characterized all his public utterances bearing with Mr. Hessian much more patiently than did the audience. Time and again throughout his address enthusiastic applause testified to the force of his arguments.

He was heard in chilly silence, sending the antagonism which his colleague, Mr. S. S. Hessian had created, he made no attempt to plead. Mr. Hessian's case with his own, but flatly asserted him. "I hope you will allow no misdeed that has occurred tonight to reflect on me," he said. This extraordinary appeal drew no response from the audience. It was very much talked of outside the meeting however, and reacted rather to the disadvantage of Mr. Knight.

Many Ladies Present
Mr. P. W. Farell presided capably at the meeting. The handsome now hall at St. George's erected through the efforts of the late Rev. Pius McDonald, was well filled and there was a large attendance of ladies. The order throughout the meeting (on the part of the audience) was excellent.

Mr. Stewart's Address
Mr. J. D. Stewart referred to the lamented death of the late Father Pius McDonald, the dearly beloved parish priest at St. George's, to whose zeal the beautiful hall re-

Mr. Stewart explained that the schools became vacant when the teachers found that they had been deceived in the promises of the Bell government.
Mr. Hessian: Tell the truth. Mr. Stewart: I am afraid you would not understand the truth of you heard it! (Laughter.)

Mr. Knight in his speech read from the School Report of 1919 to prove that there was a large number of schools closed in that year. He gave the usual Liberal arguments about the deplorable financial condition of the country when the Bell government assumed power and said that if the poll tax was done away with the farmers would have to pay it in land tax. He made the surprising declaration that he had heard that under the Conservatives Mr. Myers was going to be the Premier and Mr. Stewart would be the Attorney General. As a means of keeping the highways in repair he suggested a patrolman with a horse and cart every fifteen or twenty miles. This would keep the roads in condition all summer.

Mr. Stewart proved conclusively from page 10 of the 1919 School Report that there were only nine vacant schools up to June 30th of that year. The table shows the condition in the number of schools vacant up to June 30th, 1919 but the report covers elsewhere some whole year up to Dec. 31st, as will be found by reading the inspector's reports that follow, and which show a larger number of schools vacant. The burden of those vacant schools falls not upon the Conservatives but on the Bell government which had just taken power.

Canada May Participate in Reparations Conference

MR. HESSIAN DELIVERS A WONDERFUL SPEECH

At St. George's Friday Night Mr. S. S. Hessian Confirmed the Report Appearing in Friday's Guardian that He Had Been Appointed Attorney-General by Premier Bell, and Gave a Graphic Account of How He and the Present Attorney-General and Mr. D.C. McDonald Kept Watch Over the People's Interests While They Slept.

With reference to the report that Mr. S. S. Hessian had been appointed Attorney General and denied in Friday's Patriot the Guardian has pleasure today in furnishing a verbatim report of the speech of Mr. S. Hessian, at St. George's on Friday night, in which he fully confirms and endorses the report of the Guardian that he has been appointed Attorney General.

"You, my friends, I want you to be awfully kind to me tonight. Here is the Guardian, The Guardian for today. It says: 'I have a letter from Premier Bell in my pocket and I am appointed Attorney General.' Would you believe that the Guardian would say that? But it is right. Mr. Stewart makes no reference to that appointment, but the Guardian has no desire to accept responsibility."

"I am thirty-one years of age. Yes, that is right. And the youngest now I am making this announcement seriously—I am the youngest Attorney-General in the British world. Now that is something, is it not? That is for myself. I receive \$2,000 a year. If elected— I don't know whether I am going to be elected or not. No? That's all right. I don't know—but I will receive \$2,000 and \$500 seasonal indemnity. Do you see? That is giving me \$2,500 a year. But my friend here has received \$10,000. Now I wait for one year. What is the result? As you are, you should be waited for one year for the people judge. Don't laugh! Now, of the feeling of the meeting now, do you see? It is against me. Don't laugh. This is no bluff! I don't sit there and listen to what each man has to say. Just sit there and listen, and go home and do your whatever you deem election day is doing wrong, and do you know what that is? We are building the bridge over Fitzpatrick's Millpond. Under the terms of the Act we have to do that. Listen to this: They cannot do it. They cannot do it at all. That bridge there has to be built of concrete and reinforced. And that bridge has to be a steel bridge. There! Now that is under the Act at Ottawa.
