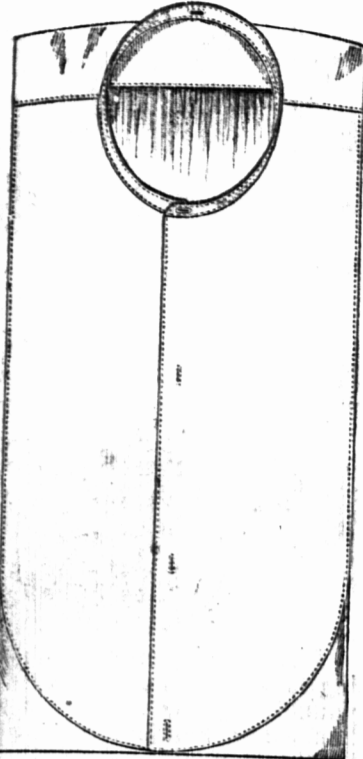

AT the Christian church last night, Evangelist Whiston again preached to a large audience. The subject last night "Why God cannot Save all Men" was handled in a masterly and thorough manner. He said that the combined inventive genius of the world could not invent a system of salvation which would save all men. It must be deep enough to reach the lowest and vilest sinner, high enough to reach the moralist and self-righteous on their throne, broad enough to take in the whole world, simple, so a child could understand, profound to attract the attention of the philosopher and scholar. Man may reason concerning morality; immortality belongs to God. Christ is the only argument to answer all conditions. But God cannot save all, only as all men establish an affinity between himself and God. That affinity is established by putting one's will under God's, and obeying conditions laid down by God. "Ye will not come" and Isaiah 59:1 he used for text. Mr. Whiston's power of applying practical illustrations is remarkable. Mr. Arthur Peters, counsel for the defendants, argued that there was no evidence under the section of the Criminal Code on which the information was based. He claimed that it must be clearly shown that the meat exposed for sale would have an injurious effect upon those eating it, and asked for an adjournment in order that he might be able to cite cases bearing upon the point raised. His Honor granted the request and adjourned the case until Wednesday next. Patrick Quinn, for drunkenness, was fined \$4 or 20 days.

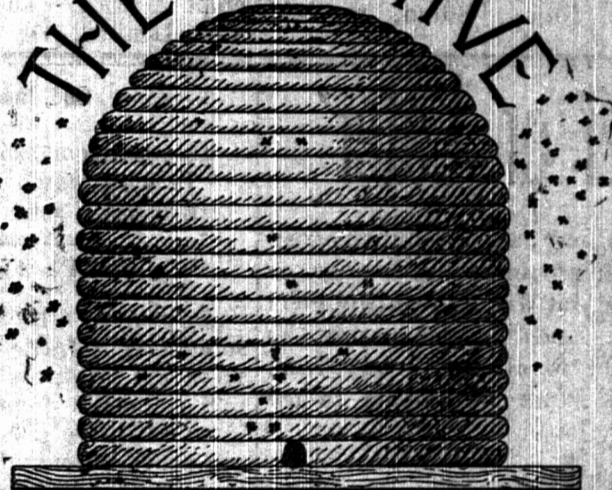
