FREE DELIVERY OF LETTERS.

We return to this subject and shall probably do so again and again until Charlottetown is granted the boon which so many Canadian cities enjoy. Charlottetown is the only capital city in Canada which has not a free delivery by letter carriers. Our Province is the only one of the older Provinces which has not this privilege.

Long ago we might have had the carrier system if we had desired it, but some persons, wanting in progressive spirit, opposed it and others were lukewarm because they did not realize the convenience and advantage which it would be to them. In those days the Post Office department could ill afford the change, for its costs the Government a good deal and there was then a big deficit in this branch of the public service. Last year the Post Office produced a surplus of over a million dollars.

This surplus is growing from year to year, and the other day Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, Postmaster General, speaking in North Bruce, Ont., said it was his purpose to expend a good portion of the surplus in improving the service. If we ask for free delivery there is little doubt but we can have it. If we do not ask, the surplus to which we contribute will be expended elsewhere. Every small town in the British Islands has the free delivery system. Why should we be behind the slow-going people of the Old World.

The Guardian is very desirous to see this modern improvement established here. The writer speaks from personal experience as to its great convenience and advantage in Ottawa and St. John. No city or town that ever enjoyed the carrier system would on any consideration go back to the old order of things. It is like water works or sewerage, once employed it is universally approved, but with this difference that it will cost us nothing to try it. And once established every person who so desires may still get his mail at the Post office as at present.

Some months ago The Guardian took a vote on the subject among its city readers, with the result that not a single ballot was recorded as opposed to the carrier system. We invite Mr. Warburton as resident Liberal candidate for this county, and who has influence with the powers at Ottawa, to take this matter up and so confer a substantial benefit upon the city. If he will do this it may go far toward relieving some past disappointments in the Government's attitude toward the city. At least whoever will bring about the free delivery system here will have the hearty thanks and commendation of The Guardian and of all really progressive citizens. And that is worth having.

The Patriot argues that our article yesterday on the subsidy increase and the tariff was based on the economic theory that an increase of duties means an increase of revenue. We neither said nor meant anything of the sort. We expressed our fear that the increased subsidies would be made the "pretext" for raising the tariff.

FOR PURE ELECTIONS.

Under our free representative institutions the people by their votes elect our law-makers and our governments. The ballot box is the source of all power. Have we a pure ballot? What are the revelations of our election courts? They are simply shocking to the mind and conscience of every moral, intelligent and patriotic citizen. Bribery by wholesale, corrupt use of money and whiskey, perjured returning officers, ballot-box stuffing, ballot-box stealing, ballot switching, regular organizations continued from election to election to win elections by fraud—such are some of the revelations from time to time made. And yet not a tithe of the evil as it exists is ever brought to light.

In the average election trial, where the petitioner is not put out of court on some technicality, the case proceeds till one or two corrupt acts by agents are proved, and thereupon the sitting member resigns his seat, and a cloak is thrown over all otherascalities that have been perpetrated. But it is comparatively rare that an election petition ever comes to trial. Petitions against Liberal members are "swapped off" against petitions to unseat Conservative members, and in this scandalous fashion all inquiry into the doings of the candidates and their agents is prevented and electoral inequities of the most flagrant kind are in scores of cases covered up and condoned.

The majority of the honest electorate have allowed their hands to be tied. If an honest candidate would run an election, whether for the Legislature or the Commons, he must put up a deposit to be forfeited if he should not obtain a given proportion of the votes polled. If having been defrauded of his election by the corrupt practices of his opponent, he seeks to have the election voided, he must put up a heavy deposit to cover the cost of the court. Could any scheme be contrived by the ingenuity of man more calculated to keep the honest poor man, or the intelligent and patriotic man of moderate circumstances, out of public life, or to protect the rascal who obtains a seat by corruption or fraud? Such are the conditions existing in Canada and in Prince Edward Island today.

Both political parties have combined in the past to bring about and establish this order of things under which not one man in a thousand can afford to contest

in election, or to undertake the unswerving of a number who has been notoriously elected by fraud or corrupt practices. Grown bolder by the success of these invasions of popular rights, we see the two parties in Parliament combine to increase their emoluments to \$2,500 per session instead of the \$500 per session for which the Macdonalds and Blakes were content to serve thirty years ago. What is it all but a huge conspiracy among those whom we thought our public servants to become our masters? And they have become our masters. The honest man's vote is stolen or swindled, or defeated by the bribed vote. The corrupt vote turns elections and defeats the honest vote.

And thus it will be so long as our churches, our temperance organizations and other moral and religious agencies remain lukewarm and apathetic toward the evils which are eating like a canker into our representative system. These evils exist because the masses of our church-going people are either content to have them so, or careless of what they see going on, or tied to the chariot wheels of party, or hopeless of providing a remedy. And yet the case is by no means hopeless if once the public conscience is aroused. It is high time for every honest upright man in Canada to take alarm and help to arouse every religious, moral and patriotic agency to a determined and decisive battle for pure elections.
