Russell Scott's Appeal Refused

CHICAGO, Feb. 17.—Russell Scott, former Toronto promoter, who turned hold-up man, was denied a new trial by Circuit Judge Thomas J. Lynch, who held he must hang in accordance with the verdict of a jury which found he killed Joseph Maurer, a drug clerk, in a robbery last year.

The prisoner was sentenced to hang on April 17, after he had made a dramatic appeal for mercy.

Scott's attorneys in arguing for a new trial had maintained that Scott was tried as an outlaw who should die and not for the murder of the drug clerk. The defence also raised two technical grounds. Thomas Scott, the aged father, collapsed when he heard the sentence. He has spent everything he has and has borrowed and pleaded for funds for his son's defence.

Young Scott was calmer today than usual. He denied his guilt and expressed the belief that sometime the truth would be known.

Wembley Exhibition Is To Reopen

LONDON, Feb. 17.—Sixty-eight governments, all under the British Crown, are to exhibit at the Wembley Imperial Exhibit on which reopens in May this year. It was announced recently by the Duke of Devonshire, the Wembley Exhibition opened last spring and in the late fall was closed for the winter. 
