Westward from Summerside there will be one train leaving at 2 p. m. and reaching Tignish at 3.30. Returning it will leave Tignish at 3 a. m. and reach Summerside 10.25 a. m. East from Charlottetown there will be one train a day leaving at 3.25 p. m. and reaching Souris at 6.25 p. m. and Georgetown at 9.05. Returning will leave Souris at 6 a. m. and Georgetown at 6.20 a. m. reaching the city at 9 a. m. On Monday, Wednesday and Friday a freight will leave Charlottetown at 7.05 a. m. reaching Souris at 11.10; and returning will leave Souris at 12.50 reaching the city at 3.05. A train will leave Emerald at 5.10 p. m. reaching Cape Traverse at 6.00 p. m. and on return will leave Cape Traverse at 7.00 a. m. reaching Emerald at 7 a. m. The Murray Harbor branch will be run as at present.

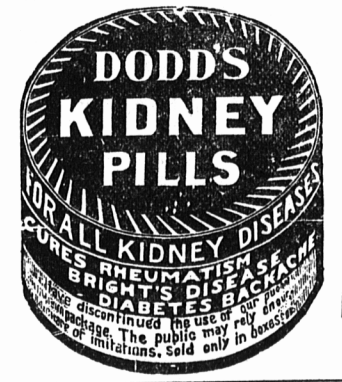
