**Wants Maritime Hospital Assoc.**

(Canadian Press)

NEWCASTLE, N. B., Oct. 23—The New Brunswick Hospital Association will confer with those of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, with the hope of forming a Maritime Association. It was decided at the third annual meeting. A resolution passed was to the effect that the New Brunswick Association join the Canadian hospital association.

Hon. Dr. H. I. Taylor, N. B., Minister of Health and Labor, spoke of the work done by his department and expressed gratitude for the generosity of Sir James Dunn, of London, Eng., who had donated a site at Bathurst for the erection of a Tuberculosis Sanatorium. The province will be in a position, presently, to care for 400 tuberculosis patients, he said, other such institutions are located at East Saint John at River Glade.

Following discussion regarding the grant received from the Provincial Government, which, it was claimed, should be increased, it was decided that a committee be appointed to study and confer with the govern-

ment and ask that either a new working out a permanent and equitable basis for distribution. Vigorous discussion of the N. B. Hospitals act ensued. It was resolved that the executive take up the matter with the provincial government and ask that either a new act be framed or amendments made. One representative each of the medical and nursing professions and labor will form the committee.

**BOSTON STRIKE GOING STRONG**

BOSTON, Mass., Oct. 23—Boston shipping interests delivered a proposal for the settlement of the strike of 2,000 longshoremen to the workers yesterday after the comments had been studied, settlement hopes evaporated.

The shipping interests said they proposed the men return to work under the agreement signed by the International Longshoremen's Association in New York a month ago, and unless this was done they would decline to deal further with the union. As this agreement was the document which brought about the strike, inasmuch as the longshoremen here objected to its provisions the proposal simply asked the workers to abandon their strike.

The longshoremen studied the document and claimed that the shippers had written in several provisions which made settlement objectionable. They claimed the proposal failed to follow the letter of the association's agreement, that it wiped out overtime pay for night work, took away the right of the union gang boss to assign his men for work, took from the checkers

His recent years were marked by misfortune. He had been living in a Brownstone rooming house and working in Wall street as an obscure customer's man. It was in stock transactions that he lost the last vestiges of his once great fortune.

**Would Raise Teachers Ages**

(By Canadian Press)

TORONTO, Ont., Oct. 23—After viewing the educational system in London, England, Mrs. H. P. Phipps, Toronto member of the Board of Education, declared that what Ontario needed most in the educational system, was better trained teachers and less emphasis on equipment. On her return from the League of Nations Assembly at Geneva, she asserted that teachers entered their profession too young, and that she favored raising the age admitting students to the teaching profession.

"I was particularly impressed by the freedom in the schools in England, more of which we ought to have in Ontario. Of course, it takes highly trained teachers to carry out this freedom and teachers with mature minds. I was amazed at the originality of the pupils who had far less equipment than those in our schools. Many of them made the things with which they worked. And I think sometimes that our classrooms should be more related to life. A girl come out of a poor home and goes into household science class where she is given equipment. In England, I saw girls doing the best work on all cook stoves such as they might have used at home," she said.

**Premier Stresses Vital Part Of Educationists**

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 23—(By The Canadian Press)—In an inspirational address here last night, Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett spoke of the unconscious influence exercised by teachers in the moulding of Canada as a nation. The Prime Minister addressed some two two hundred visiting Toronto teachers, as well as a large number of Ottawa instructors.

"The development of a child's life as it marches to childhood is an important factor in the development of Canada." He declared. "The development of this Dominion rests not with industry, nor with populous cities. The advancement of child life is the determining factor in the life of the country. And it rests upon the hope and faith and conscious belief that the plastic minds under your control can be shaped to influence the destiny of the world."

The responsibilities of teachers today were greater than ever before, Mr. Bennett stated. "You never know what the potential greatness of a child may be," the Prime Minister remarked.

His wholehearted appreciation of the commendable work teachers were performing towards the nationhood of Canada, his deep and abiding interest in education were expressed by the Prime Minister.

With several official duties to discharge, Mr. Bennett spoke briefly.

**Thomas Finds Election Battle A Savage One**

LONDON, Oct. 23—(By Hambleton)—"This election," Rt. Hon. J. H. Thomas, National-Labor Secretary for Dominions and Colonies, said last night in a campaign speech at Derby, "is not only the most momentous but the most savage I have known. Why it is that I am howled at, sneered at and even spat at by people whom I have given my soul to help? He asked. "My answer to those who say I betrayed them is that, though I worked for, and in, the movement which had for its object the social improvement of the people, I never believed nor preached that the machine is more important than the nation," he continued, "it must smash."

And in support of Mr. Thomas at Derby, Mr. MacDonald remarked, "Mr. Thomas is one of my tried friends in fair weather or foul. He is not one of those people who come before you constantly for an office, and when you are in trouble avoid your doorstep and begin to malign you."

**WANTS WIFE TO FACE CHARGES**

(Canadian Press)

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 23—A new appeal to Mrs. Winnie Ruth Judd to surrender and face charges of slaying her friends, Angles Le Roi and Helvig Samuelson, whose bodies were sent here in trunks from Phoenix, Ariz., was issued today by the fugitive's husband, Dr. W. C. Judd.

Police believed the woman might be hiding in the cave-like recesses in the hill of Beverly Glen.

Dr. Judd's appeal was made after a conference with his lawyer. Both he and attorney Richard Cantillon, however, denied knowledge of Mrs. Judd's whereabouts.

Dr. Judd again expressed fear she had committed suicide.

"I know that she has not a violent temper," he said, "and has never been subject to attacks of violent temper."

"If she has committed the crime with which she is charged it means that it was done in a period of irresponsibility and in an irrational state or condition."

"I want to assure her that if this comes to her attention she will have every support and assistance I am able to give her."


