Mr. Bennett Not Worrying Over Constitutional Bogey Raised By Mackenzie King

"If the Conservative Government succeeds on July 28, and I have every reason to believe it will," Mr. Bennett exclaimed, "I will see to it that old age pensions are paid to every province of the Dominion from the Federal treasury. That is my answer to a Prime Minister who is not concerned with the importation into Canada of Russian coal and New Zealand butter. That is my answer to a Prime Minister who says the payment of money to the provinces for old age pensions is a vicious principle. It is a national obligation. Premier King says it cannot be done constitutionally! If the Dominion can pay fifty per cent of old age pensions, why cannot it pay 99 per cent?" —Hon. R. B. Bennett at Yarmouth, July 2.
