LONDON, August 21.—Hon. Mr. Hazen left for Canada today accompanied by Rear Admiral Kingmill. Mr. Hazen expresses himself gratified with the growth of the idea of imperial federation in England and with the attitude of parliamentarians of both parties towards imperial defense. It is generally accepted in Great Britain that if the dominions are going to help solve the problems of imperial defense and bear its burden they should have a voice in moulding the foreign policy which that scheme is to uphold. The time is not far distant when imperial representation of some parliamentary character will be granted to the overseas dominions," said Mr. Hazen.

**POACHER'S DEATH.**

LONDON, August 21.—The death of the elephant poacher and illicit ivory trader, James Ward Rogers, a native of Wayland, Allegan county, Michigan, while being pursued by Captain C. V. Fox, an officer of the British army in the Egyptian service in Central Africa, is not likely to result in international complications. The British Foreign office has not so far received any communication from the United States government, and the incident is considered closed as far as Great Britain and Belgium are concerned.

It is stated at the foreign office today that Rogers' companions, whose names are Pierce and Lane, are British subjects and not Americans, Rogers' death occurred on Belgium territory, and when Captain Fox became aware of that fact he promptly sent a report to the nearest Belgian fort and apologized for his mistake.

A Belgian force escorted Captain Fox to the boundary and took charge of the prisoners, who included two men, Pierce and Lane. Officials of the foreign office believe that these were afterwards released, but have no official information to that effect. Pierce was the man who was given the title of doctor altho it appears doubtful that he was a medical man.

A hundred natives were also taken prisoners and handed over to the Belgians.

It is reported that Rogers was wounded by one of his own natives in the course of a skirmish with Captain Fox's advance scouts. Captain Fox removed the bullet from the wounded man and nursed Rogers for four days until his death.

**SEALING TRIPS.**  
OTTAWA, August 21.—Colonel McCrea and Colonel McEwen, the sheep authorities, who have been investigating the sheep industry have completed their inquiries. Colonel McCrea has been investigating particulars in British Columbia and Colonel McEwen in the Maritime Provinces. They will meet in Ottawa on Friday and will draw up their report and recommendations which they will make to the minister.

**UNIFORMITY OF TAXATION.**  
OTTAWA, August 21.—The commission of conservation is having compiled an analysis of assessment laws of the different provinces and their application by different municipalities, in regard to timber areas and lumber. It is stated that there is great lack of uniformity and the desire is to, remedy the situation.

**WILL VISIT SCOTLAGD.**  
LONDON, Aug. 21.—King George and Queen Mary will pay a visit in the autumn to Floors Castle, the residence in Kelso, Scotland, of the Duke and Duchess of Roxburgh. His Majesty shot 142 brace of grouse yesterday on Lord Sontoms Lancashire moors. The shooting party comprised seven guns and the total bag was 702 brace, a local record.

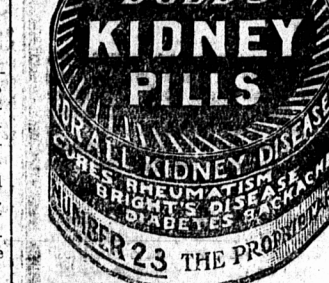
