

B. C. Sheep For Siberia
(Canadian Press)

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 29.—Forty-six head, comprising thirty five ewes and eleven rams, have been purchased by an official of the dominion government under instructions from the Soviet government for despatch to Vladivostok, as soon as arrangements can be made for their shipment.

Flocks in Russia and Siberia were greatly depleted during and following the war. The quality of the stock was allowed to deteriorate through neglect and now the Soviet government is making efforts to restore the standard by the importations of high class stock.

The Soviet government communicated with the government of Canada relative to the matter, asking that a certain number of sheep be purchased in Western Canada and shipped to the order of the administration in Russia.

Arrangements are now being made for shipment and also for the payment by the Soviet authorities. As soon as those details are adjusted, the sheep will be put aboard ship at Vancouver for Vladivostok, probably by way of Japan.

That Car Of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers on How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

COVERS ARE INNOCENT.
Spring covers have been condemned unjustly because annoying squeaks have been traced to rust between the leaves of springs. The truth of the matter is that many drivers do not attach boots until after dirt, water and grit have become firmly lodged—locking the barn after the horse is stolen. Even if the motorist over lubricates the boots it is doubtful whether he can overcome the conditions. How can he overcome the conditions. He may force grease into the boots but fail to remove the dirt and rust between the leaves.

TRACKING DOWN THE NOISE.
Inasmuch as modern transmissions are built as units with the power plant and clutch it is important to consider these as other parts of the car if the transmission becomes annoying. The latter may be acting as a sounding board for other noise sources and the trouble may be some distance from the gears. Whipping universal joints develop some queer noises and even may go so far as to damage a transmission bearing.

SOME Q'S WITH BUT ONE A
The question often is raised by car owners as to whether the insurance applies if their automobile is stolen when they have neglected to lock it. A number of motorists always are wondering whether it voids the insurance to leave a car standing out all night. Others ask "What if the car is stolen from a garage where the owner does not use the lock on account of preventing the car from being moved in event of fire?" The answer to these queries is an emphatic but subtle "yes". The insurance company invariably pay the claims, but the car owners pay for their negligence. These unnecessary losses are reflected in the high rates which all must pay.

EXPLAINS THE DIFFERENCE.
The difference between the magnet and the generator is that in the former the magnetic poles that furnish the magnetic field through which the armature revolves are of the permanent type. They are strongly magnetized to start with, on the other hand, make their magnetic fields as they go.

THIS HELPS IN TRAFFIC.
It is well to de-clutch and accelerate the engine occasionally when compelled to move slowly through traffic in intermediate gear. The slow operation of the motor is likely to load up the engine with oil or raw gas or encourage it to stall. The needle valve of the carburetor may stick or the constant slow running may help to discharge the battery. Speeding up the battery now and then makes the conditions more normal.

ENGINE SERVICE HINT.
When removing the head to grind valves or clean out carbon on most makes of cars it is best to disconnect the distributor head and keep the ignition wiring intact. The more natural inclination is to disconnect the ignition wires from the spark plugs, which of course necessitates tracing the wires carefully when reassembling the job. Any carelessness in this process results in throwing the engine out of time. When the wiring is carried with the head of the engine each plug can be removed separately, and cleaned, when the head is on the work bench.

BUT THEY SHOULDN'T BE.
Gears can be shifted without the fanciful to many drivers, but it is a fact. Don't try it, however, unless you're an expert. Transmission, wreckage may result.
