RAIDING TRIBES TO BE PUNISHED

They Are Joined By Afghans And British Force Will Be Sent Against Them Commanded By General Sir James Wilcocks

SIMLA, April 23—(Special)—A mixed force of British and Indian troops is at present being rapidly mobilized near Peshawar for another punitive expedition against fanatical tribes who recently have been raiding and looting villages on the Peshawar borders.

Ten thousand malcontents are gathering at Kamall, twenty miles from Peshawar and several thousand Afghans are said to have crossed the Kabul River to join them.

The officials of the Ameer of Afghanistan are apparently making no effort to check the movement.

The British force now being organized near Peshawar will be commanded by Sir James Wilcocks, who stamped out the recent uprising among the Zakhia Khels.

PRESIDENT OF THE C. P. RAILWAY

Talks Over Matters With a Representative of the Halifax Mail—Some Interesting Facts

HALIFAX, April 22—Sir Thomas Shaughnessy, president of the C. P. R., spent the day in Halifax. He is a passenger on the Empress of Britain for England.

Sir Thomas was interviewed by a representative of the Mail as soon as the big liner docked. He said he was making a combined business and pleasure trip which would last about a month.

Asked about the statement made to a St. John reporter, in which he said passengers by the Empress would arrive at Liverpool nearly a day later on account of having to call at Halifax for the mails, he claimed that the mails instead of arriving at Liverpool on Friday, for distribution that day and the next, would not arrive until Saturday, with distribution on Monday.

"Would it remedy matters if the C. P. R. terminus were Halifax?" was asked.

"The only objection to Halifax," said he, "is that we cannot make it our port. If the C. P. R. could secure running rights over the I. C. R. at a reasonable rate, the mails and passengers would be landed here and the freight being taken around to St. John, for the most part. We could not afford to pay for the running rights in the ordinary sense of the word. A plan could be worked out which would do justice to the country, the I. C. R. and the C. P. R., and Halifax would be the gainers. As it now is, the steamers are compelled to call at Halifax simply as a matter of sentiment."

"Has the C. P. R. given up trying for running rights," was asked.

"No," said the C. P. R. president, "we are as keen as ever on the project." This session of parliament has been of such a nature that it has been impossible to have such a mat-

ter considered by it. We would like to have the same chance to do business with Halifax that we have with all other important business centres of the country. We want rational arrangements, however."

"How does St. John compare with Halifax as a port?" was the question next asked.

Sir Thomas said, "he always avoided that subject. He had heard that Halifaxians claimed a few superiorities for their port over St. John."

The C. P. R. relation to the All Red line was spoken of. All had been said on this subject that could be said at present said he, but the C. P. R. is ready to take its place in the movement when it comes to a head.

"Will Quebec be boycotted on account of the Longshoremens' demands?"

"Well, nothing has been done. Three rivers may be chosen instead of Quebec, but nothing is settled."

DISCUSSION OF THE IMMIGRATION BONUS

Continued In The Commons, Serious Charges Made, The Doukhobors Again, The Unemployed, Unsafety Of Dufferin Terrace.

OTTAWA, April 23—(Special)—Mr. Aylesworth told Mr. Lake that the Government would not ship the Doukhobors back to Saskatchewan. They could go where they liked but must obey the law.

Sir Fred. Borden said he had heard Dufferin Terrace at Quebec is unsafe but he would have it inspected before the Tercentenary.

Mr. Robitaille resuming the debate on Monk's amendment favoring the abolition of immigration bonuses, made a scathing criticism of the Government's policy, and said there was being thrust on Canada a scum element from the old country which was undesirable. He strongly supported Monk's resolution.

Mr. Cocksbutt criticized the statement by Mr. Oliver that for every man out of work now there were ten out in 1896.

The reverse was the actual case, said Cocksbutt, and he pointed out that the greatest of many evils in the Government's immigration policy was the bonus.

He trusted the Minister of the Interior would soon be able to announce that the bonus system had ceased.

Ralph Smith thought more labor was needed in Canada for railway construction.

FLYWHEEL BURST AND KILLED TWO

Injuring Others, Wrecking Electric Power Building And Put Out Lights.

CHICAGO, April 23—(Special)—The burst of a flywheel at the North Shore Electric Light at Waukegan last night caused the death of two men and probably fatally injuring two others and brought darkness a number of the North Shore suburbs.

The belt of the huge flywheel, measuring twenty feet in diameter, turned and the flywheel "ran wild" and burst in many places.

Fragments flew in all directions, shattering the roof and walls of the brick buildings.

THAW SIGNS HABEAS CORPUS

NEWBURGH, N. Y., April 22.—Counsel for Harry K. Thaw today served an order of the supreme court upon the superintendent of the Matewan Insane Asylum to permit Thaw to sign an application for a writ of habeas corpus. Thaw then signed the application, which will be submitted to a justice of the supreme court. Thaw will then be brought into court for a hearing on the question of his sanity.

THE GLACE BAY GAZETTE BURNED

Out By A Fire That Broke Out In Pressroom—Loss \$15,000

HALIFAX, April 23—(Special)—The Glace Bay Gazette, the principal newspaper of the town, was burned out this afternoon.

The fire broke out in the press room of the paper and before it was under control the whole interior of the building was destroyed.

The Gazette's loss will be \$15,000 with \$8,000 insurance.

The upper floor of the building was occupied as a nickel theatre.

Travis Bros dealers in musical instruments were also tenants of the building.

BOMB OUTRAGE IN CALIFORNIA

Intended To Kill Witness In San Francisco Bribery Case—House Was Wrecked But The Intended Victims Escape

OAKLAND, Calif., April 23—(Special)—An attempt was made on the life of B. L. Gallagher, one of the main witnesses for the prosecution in the San Francisco bribery case, last night at the home of Wm. H. Scheneck, his brother-in-law in East Oakland.

A huge bomb placed in the porch exploded and tore away the whole front of the house.

Gallagher was upstairs with his wife and Scheneck was in a rear room with his wife and four children.

All escaped except one boy who was hit in the neck by a piece of a missile.

Gallagher's hat was pierced by a splinter and the house was wrecked. Gallagher was a member of the board of supervisors of San Francisco who confessed to receiving bribes. He was chairman of the Finance Committee and according to his testimony acted as an intermediary between Abraham Ruef and other members of the board.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND WOMAN KILLED BY AN AUTOMOBILE

May McIntosh Struck After Alighting From Street Car In Watertown, Mass—Belonged To Prince Edward Island And Was Visiting In Watertown

WATERTOWN, April 22—Miss May McIntosh, 28 years old, was struck by an automobile driven by F. O. Thompson of 508 Craigie hall, Cambridge, at the corner of Mt. Auburn and Adams streets tonight and so severely injured that she died within an hour in the Cambridge hospital. Thompson was arrested.

Thompson, who is a student in the Harvard law school, was driving his machine along Mt. Auburn street, and as he approached the corner of Adams street the woman was crossing. Before he was able to bring his machine to a stop, the woman had been struck and thrown some little distance.

Thompson picked the unconscious woman up and hurried her to the Cambridge hospital in his car. The physicians found that her chest had been crushed, her skull fractured and that she had received multiple injuries of the body. She died without regaining consciousness.

At the station house Thompson said that he was running his machine on Mt. Auburn street toward Boston, and near the corner of Adams street an outward bound electric car stopped. The woman evidently got off this car and started to cross the street from behind the car, when she was run down by the auto.

Thompson, after he had removed the woman to the hospital, notified the Watertown police by telephone, but they were unable to learn very much more about the accident.

On the ground near the scene of the accident the police found a gold watch and a bracelet. Inside the case of the watch was the following inscription, "John to May, 1902."

Ball was given for Thompson by friends from Cambridge.

Miss McIntosh lived in Prince Edward Island and was visiting in the home of Charles H. Helman, 3 Oliver road, Watertown. A cousin, John, works for the Dunster cafe, and she is said to have a sister in Roxbury.

NEW INSPECTOR MEAT DIVISION

OTTAWA, April 23—(Special)—Dr. Barnes, Chief travelling inspector of the meat inspection division in connection with the agriculture department has been promoted to take charge of all inspectorial work for the Dominion succeeding Dr. Ward.

Barnes is succeeded by Dr. Bruce of the Inspectorial staff.

KOREANS, TRIED TO DESTROY RAILWAY

Damage Was Discovered In Time and Prince Ito Was Not Delayed

TOKIO, April 22—An attempt to destroy the railroad leading from Seoul to the capital of Korea on the morning of April 16, was discovered before any serious damage had been done, and Prince Ito arrived at Seoul on schedule time.

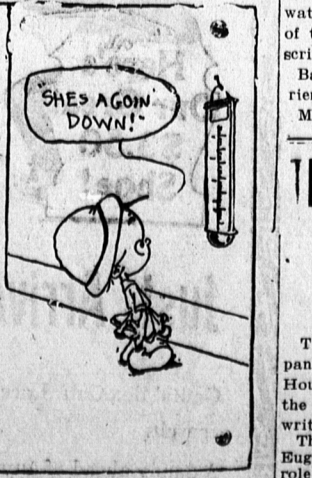
