Canadians Are Drifting Back

OTTAWA, July 5.—Drift of Canadian settlers south so far as is indicated by the value of settlers effects exported, is declining. The Canadian Government does not keep statistics of outgoing Canadians, but the value of settlers effects both outgoing and incoming is recorded.

These, as given by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics for the year ending May, show a heavy decline in settlers effects exported to the United States as compared with the previous 12 months.
