**DOCTORS APPROVE PRE-MARITAL TEST**

MONTREAL, June 25.—Objections to the immediate enactment of legislation dealing with the subject of medical examination before marriage was voted today at the annual meeting of the Canadian Public Health Association. The matter was brought up in a resolution which was adopted at the meeting, and which read as follows:

"Resolved, that this organization endorses the principle of medical examination before marriage, but that it is opposed to the enactment at the present time of legislation dealing with this subject."

Another resolution recommended "that the education and training of sanitary inspectors be provided for by the provincial governments and universities." Dr. Norman Harris, the retiring president, remarked that sanitary inspectors are an important factor in public health administration.

The attendance of all provincially organized health officers' associations was drawn to the fact that they are automatically members of the C. P. H. A. and that their respective presidents and secretaries are members of the executive council of the organization.

having taken its place among the great and strategic cities of the world with startling swiftness, everything connected with it is of new interest in Britain.

The retirement of Dr. Hastings from the post of Medical Officer of Health of Toronto, is due to impairment of health. For nineteen years he has borne the burden of departmental responsibilities and administrative duties. The city is losing a most valuable executive who put Toronto on the front rank for its progress in medical and sanitary science.

St. Michael's hospital has just graduated the largest class of nurses on record, there being fifty two who passed.

Dr. T. T. Shields, who has been figuring on the front page of the papers very extensively, of late, is the reason why the Toronto Association of Baptist churches, without a dissenting voice, voted to expel the Jarvis Street Baptist church. The reason given was that the conduct of its pastor, Dr. Shields, was not in harmony with the association.

Three prominent Toronto men, and the editor of a weekly paper, called Hush, which is something along the lines of the Calgary Eye-Opener, though lacking its humor, were involved in a violent melee at the Thorncliffe races, and a warrant charging aggravated assault has been sworn out against each of them. The affair has created a good deal of talk.

Islanders are gradually migrating back to their summer cottages on Centre Island and Hanlon's point, and are finding that sidewalks have disappeared, back doors are fronting on miniature lakes, and that the sea of the Island has been considerably cut down by the ravages of old Lake Ontario.

C. N. R. APPEALS FROM RATES

OTTAWA, June 25.—Grain rates eastward are vitally affected in a case to come before the Railway Commission tomorrow, when the Canadian National Railways will seek leave to appeal on points of law from the judgment of the commission in 1927, reducing from 3½ to 18.34 cents, the rate per hundred on grain from Armstrong to Quebec over the trans-continental line. The appeal, if allowed, will be to the Supreme Court.

While the Crow's Nest rates do not apply east of the lakes, the Commission, in making the adjustment, chose to compare these rates with what apply eastward and found that the result then existing created at Armstrong a barrier. The board's order reduced this.

The Canadian National now appeals on the ground that the Trans-continental Railway Act and no other governs in this matter. Three or four points are advanced, all of them questioning the legality of the order.

It is believed that influences which have stirred up the appeal are the demand of Halifax and St. John for an arbitrary rate of one cent a bushel in advance of the rate to Quebec and also the application of the Quebec Board of Trade to further reduce the 18 cent rate to the equivalent of the new lake and rail rate to Buffalo and New York by American lines.
