TIGNISH TEACHERS CONVENTION

The first annual meeting of the Tignish local convention was held in Tignish High School on Thursday Sept 4th. A varied and interesting program was well carried out. The attendance was good and each teacher was anxious to co-operate. The combined efforts of so many enthusiasts brought wonderful success. After the enrollment of teachers the following committees were appointed:—Nomination: Catherine Arsenault, Eleanor Buote, Ida Fennessey, Resolution: J. W. Gani, George Doyle Frances Kenny, Press Lillian Cahill, Hazel Harper, Eulalia Chaisson.

An interesting address was then given by the President Mr Elmer Pineau. He stressed the importance of joining the Federation and spoke of the benefits derived from such connections where views relative to different phases of school work may be exchanged course of studies explained by supervisors and superintendent, and teachers helped by suggestions and criticisms that are brought up.

Mr H. H. Shaw, Superintendent of Education, gave a very interesting address in the course of which he emphasized the importance of keeping up the Federation, and he encouraged the teachers to raise the standard in order to enable them to demand high salaries as well as do better work. In regard to the teaching of English Mr Shaw said it was the most important subject. Many pupils fall in Arithmetic simply because they misunderstand the English in which the problem is written. He recommended a library in every school, so that the pupils may have plenty of reading matter and reference books. Mr Shaw also spoke of the excellent work done by the Women's Institute.

The afternoon session opened with remarks by Supervisor Gallant. This was followed by an excellent paper read by Mrs L. J. Murphy on "How to Arouse Interest in the Pupils." This brought forth many complimentary remarks by Miss McLean, Mr. Henderson, Mr Gallant, and others. A vote of thanks also was tendered Mrs Murphy.

Miss Catherine McLean, Organizer of the Junior Red Cross gave a very delightful demonstration on Health Work in the School, and made a special point of securing the co-operation of the teachers in forming Junior Red Cross Branches in the schools.

Miss Gillis, Supervisor, addressed the meeting on several subjects of great importance to the teachers. Some of these subjects were Time Table, Physical Training, Keep up the Register, and Silent Reading.

The Question Box proved very interesting and of invaluable aid to the teachers present.

The following resolutions were passed:—Whereas there is great difficulty in procuring text books at the beginning of the School Term; Therefore be it resolved that all booksellers be provided with a course of studies at least two weeks before school opens.

Whereas there is much retardation among pupils and whereas teachers have no definite way of measuring the ability of pupils; Therefore resolved that the Convention ask the Department of Education to provide mental ability tests to be given by the supervisors to the pupils.

Resolved that the thanks of this local Convention be tendered Supervisors Gillis and Gallant, Miss McLean, Mr Henderson also the trustees of this district for use of school room.

The election of officers resulted as follows:—
President, Elmer Pineau (re-elected)
Secretary, George Doyle.
The singing of the National Anthem brought the meeting to a close.
