The monthly meeting of the Georgetown Community Welfare League was held in the Council Chambers on Monday, April 4th. The president, F. J. Solomon presided and an encouraging number of members were in attendance. The minutes of the annual meeting were read by secretary Richard DeLory and the treasurer's and auditor's report was presented by treasurer, Howard S. MacLean. Both reports were moved adopted. Mr. Guy Hemphill reported on the progress being made in the cutting of lumber in Lower Montague for the erection of the Community Recreational Center. It is estimated that in the vicinity of 13,000 feet is now cut and piled. It is planned to continue cutting operations when the remainder of the harbour ice moves out and crossings can be made by boat. The president read a record of the free labour, so far contributed. Authorization was given to meet payments on the lumber and on aluminum roofing, now on order. The meeting adjourned until the first Monday in May.

POLICE FIND CLUBS CURB DELINQUENCY

By The Canadian Press MONTREAL, March — (CP) — Not content with having 52,000 boys in his police clubs, Capt. Det. Ovide Pelletier, head of the Montreal police juvenile delinquency prevention bureau went on the prowl here recently to pick new members.

At a meeting in a local police station about 200 boys heard representatives from the Montreal bench, clergy, police and city hall tell of the work of the police clubs in curbing juvenile delinquency. And to help them swallow the bare facts the youngsters were stuffed with ice cream and soft drinks.

Capt. Pelletier said since his statistics showed juvenile delinquency had dropped 54 per cent in the past three years.

Police Director Albert Langlois said that since peak hours of juvenile delinquency were between 6 p.m. and midnight, the clubs contributed largely to the decrease of delinquency by providing some place for the youths to play during those hours.

The police clubs are planning a campaign to raise \$125,000 to open and equip gymnasiums. "Boys are in prison today because we did not have these clubs," added Capt. Pelletier, who thinks more gymnasiums are the answer to juvenile delinquency.

HOUSING PROJECT OPENS IN LONDON

LONDON, March — (CP) — John Watson, 31-year-old ex-serviceman, is the first tenant on the London Country Council's new luxury housing estate at Woodbury Down, Stoke Newington, North London.

When John Edwards, new parliamentary secretary to the board of trade, handed over a brand new key, Watson sighed and said: "Gosh, I've been waiting two years and living in lodging houses for this moment."

For his three-room apartment on the first floor of the cream-painted block—with its own elevator, built-in cupboards, central heating and private sun balconies — Watson pays a weekly inclusive rent of 35 shillings (\$7).

See Marked Improvement In Newfoundland Health

NEW YORK, April 4 — (CP) — Better food has improved the health of Newfoundlanders since 1944 but the diet in Canada's new province still is below scratch, a nutrition conference here was told today.

Doctors who made two food surveys in St. John's and southcoast fishing villages credited most of the gain to extra vitamins which the population got from "enriched" white flour and margarine.

They said the biggest need now is to increase the supply of ascorbic acid or vitamin C — the vitamin found in such foods as fresh fruits and vegetables.

And they urged continuation of public-education programs to change the cooking habits of the people — to stop them cooking out the vitamins in the foods they usually eat.

Seven nutrition experts took part in today's conference. All of them helped make nutrition surveys in Newfoundland in 1944 and 1948.

"The outward signs of malnutrition had become less conspicuous and less prevalent in 1948 than they were in 1944," said Dr. Russell M. Wilder, professor of medicine at the Mayor Foundation of Rochester, Minn.

"With them had gone much of the apathy and listlessness so characteristic of the population in 1944. The quality of life had improved in Newfoundland."

He listed these other improvements: The reported death rate fell from 12.1 to 10.5 per thousand the number of tuberculosis deaths decreased sharply; infant mortality was "strikingly reduced."

"We must inevitably give the principal credit for the improvements... to enrichment of the flour and fortification of the margarine," he said.

"Newfoundland flour has been enriched since 1944 by addition of riboflavin or vitamin B2, thiamine or vitamin B1, and niacin which is an anti-pellagra vitamin. Vitamin A has been added to margarine, doubling the Newfoundlanders' intake of that health requirement."

Woman Forecasts Weather

BERMUDA, April 4 — (CP) — In an area where hurricanes can blow up faster than you can say "Bermuda sunshine," Ruth Russell, "is responsible for forecasting the weather."

Twenty-seven-year-old Ruth is Bermuda's first woman forecaster. She took up meteorology as a career after graduating from the University of London in 1941. She was one of the first 10 girls to enter the W.A.A.F. as a meteorologist.

In 1944 she left the W.A.A.F. and took up flying. After obtaining her pilot's license, she ferried planes in England for the Air Transport Auxiliary. When the war ended, to pay his respects will not be so surprised.

The biggest will be at Kalyan in Bombay Province about 36 miles from here. This township, with 20,000 tenements, will house 100,000 refugees and will cost \$2,000,000.
