INTERESTED IN FLAX PROGRESS - Interest in the news of the invention of a new method of flax processing by Mr. Frank L. Smith, a former Prince Edward Islander, is expressed in a letter received by Mr. A. W. Hyndman, manager of the Royal Bank, from Mr. T. A. Gordon, of the firm of Gordon and Son, Regina, Ontario. Mr. Gordon writes that he has seen the flax mills operated during the Great War and for some time afterwards, but the business, owing to the Russian trade with Belfast, was practically ruined. "We would be pleased," he says, "to grow flax and scotch it here for the Leasdale markets. It might be possible to have a permanent trade established." As noted in The Guardian, this Province is also well adapted to the growing of high quality flax, a handicraft industry in flax processing having existed here since the arrival of the Acadians. Ontario and Prince Edward Island seem to be the two provinces particularly interested in the news of Mr. Smith's invention.
