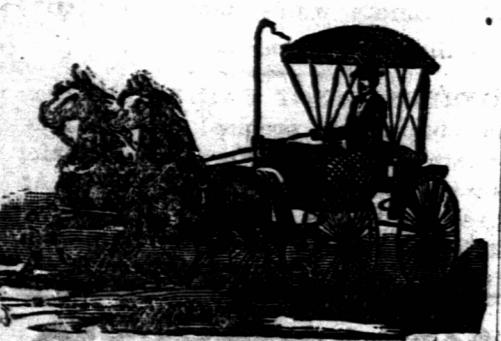

In referring to the wheat outlook during the coming cereal year the London States says that the continent will probably be called upon to supply 200,000,000 to 240,000,000 bushels. The shortage in the French camp with the large demand, lower prices next season are not looked for.

The theory that orchards and vineyards can be protected from hailstones and frosts by cannon firing has been characterized as a delusion. Professor Willis Moore the chief of the Washington weather bureau says that the great processes of the atmosphere are on too large a scale for any man or nation to control them.

The Montreal Star says: Prof. Schurman, the P. E. Islander, who now presides over one of the neighboring Republic's chief universities, recently aroused much criticism by announcing that the United States had no great writers. This has led to the retort that if they have not produced a Shakespeare, they have a Bacon renowned throughout the world.

There is certainly a thought in the following: Now is the time for everybody who finds it too hot to cook meals, make beds, sweep, dust and keep houses generally to go and visit somebody else who feels the same way about it. The golden rule, "Let us visit others as we would have them visit us," would if put into general use, stop a lot of the mid-summer visiting madness.

While the principal nations of the world are grabbing and increasing their territory Holland is perfecting a plan for expending \$38,000,000 in creating a province. The new province now lies at the bottom of the stormy, dangerous, useless Zuyder Zee. A dyke is to be built, the great salt-water lake is to be pumped dry and \$50,000 acres of fertile land will be annexed to Holland. This new province is ideal. It meets all the conditions which sane nations insist upon before annexing—it is contiguous to the national domain; it is capable of sustaining a population like that of the nation; it offers opportunities for settlement. While the great powers are squandering their resources, Holland is adding to hers. While they are providing distant graves for their soldiers, Holland is providing adjacent homes for her peaceful citizens.

For many years inventors have been endeavoring to perfect a system by which the shop lifter will be trapped. It is thought that the mirror that can be seen through will fill the bill. They are of so called "platinized glass, being packed with a compound made of 95 per cent silver and 5 per cent platinum, and, optically speaking, they are exceedingly curious and interesting. Looking into a glass of this kind one finds first-rate reflection; it is a mirror and nothing more. At the same time a person on the other side can see directly through it. For example, a glass of this sort placed in front of the prescription desk in an apothecary shop, perfectly conceals the prescription clerk and his apparatus. Thus the privacy of that department is secured, while on this part the clerk is able to survey the shop and see everybody who comes in just as if the mirror were ordinary glass. It is transparent to him, but is like any common mirror from the point of view of people in front. It is easily seen that glass of this kind is likely to be useful for a good many purposes. It can be put in the doors of dark bath rooms, or of any other rooms where privacy is desirable and light is wanted.

A schoolmaster in Chelsea, England, has been imbued with a happy thought and one that will be learned with delight by millions of the sterner sex throughout the world. **U. S. Abolishing Rations to Indians.**

Gradually the United States government is doing away with the distribution of rations to Indians. In five years the system will be practically abolished. There are now in the United States 268,000 Indians. Of this number 45,250 draw rations regularly, while 12,600 more are provided for at various times when they are unable to work or do not feel like it. In the latter class are included most of the Indians who have grown old and are deserted by their young relatives.

**SALOON ANTAGONISTIC TO CHURCH**

The Rev. J. A. Eby, pastor of the First United Brethren church at Greensburg, Pa., has made the discovery that there are more saloon frequenters than men churchgoers in Greensburg. To acquire data for a series of sermons on "The Sins of Our Times," six of Mr. Eby's parishioners were detailed the other evening to count the number of men who entered the six saloons in town. During the hour allotted to the watchers of the saloon doors, 1,500 men entered the bar doors. The count at the doors of the entire twelve churches showed that 737 men attended church.

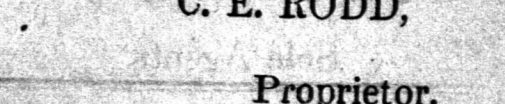

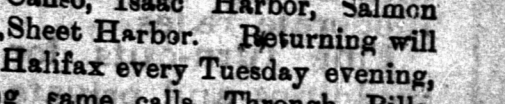
