what Chelsea buns are. And more than that. Chelsea buns are a British institution. They are a bond of Empire. They are the outward and edible signs of an inward spirit of compromise. They are to the British democracies what the fasces are to the Italian fascists, and the hammer and sickle to the Russian communists. Or if they aren't they ought to be.

For the key to British history, the clarification of the democratic process, the whole secret of the capitalist state is rolled up in a Chelsea bun. Is it not the aim of all good bakers of Chelsea buns to arrange the sugar, the currants the cinnamon and the dough that flavor and fruit shall be honestly divided throughout? It is. With a little the most of the sweetness and stickiness on the top, naturally, but not too much the most. Not enough the most to make the consumer resentful.

And it is not the practice of false bakers at home and overseas to sell the populace a Chelsea bun that, beneath its top-dressing of adhesive sweetness, is no more than meagre crumb bereft of sweetness of spice and of fruit? It certainly is.

Airflight Start from Montreal

NEW YORK, May 20 (CP)—Amy Mollison, British Aviator said today she would attempt to have the Lindbergh Memorial Flight, originally scheduled from New York to Paris, start from Montreal. Angry at the United States Commerce Department for refusing to grant certificates to entrants, Miss Mollison said before she sailed on the liner Normandie that while in Paris she would seek to have Montreal chosen as starting point.

Remove Duty On Brazil Oranges

OTTAWA, May 20—(CP)—Oranges from Brazil will come into Canada free from May 1 to June 30. Hon. J. L. Ilsley, minister of national revenue announced today. It is estimated that 200,000 cubic feet of oranges will enter Canada from Brazil during that period which at the regular tariff of 35 cents a cubic foot would have paid \$70,000 in customs duty.

Under Canada-United States trade agreement oranges enter Canada free from most favored nations from Jan. 1 to April 30. Recently by order-in-council the period of free entry was extended to June 30 for all nations having trade agreements with Canada.

Brazil, however, does not come under most favored nation treatment and consequently oranges from there were subject to duty. Brazilian Consul General Arno Konder of Montreal made representations to the Government that importation of a considerable quantity of oranges from his country would be possible if placed on the free list.

CHANGES IN BEHAVIOR IN BOYS AND GIRLS MAY BE DUE TO GLAND CHANGES. Boys and girls who have been neat, alert, obedient and truthful may begin to show evidences of untidiness, backwardness at school, disobedience, and to tell lies or make excuses for their defects or deficiencies.

Unfortunately, fathers believe it necessary to thash, and mothers to scold until these youngsters acquire a condition of "low cunning" in trying to justify themselves or their actions. It is thus often a long time before the parents realize that the change in character and disposition has come on at the age of puberty, and that it is possible that some physical condition or defect of some gland change may be responsible for the symptoms. The family physician is then consulted. In some cases the family physician finds that there is some physical reason for the change in appearance and behavior.

It is infection from leishmaniasis, intestinal, which when corrected restores the boy or girl to their previous normal condition. Very often also there is some disturbance of the glands of the body particularly of the glands that change the boy into a man and the girl into a woman. The thyroid gland lying on the neck and the pituitary gland lying on the floor of the skull likewise undergo change or development at this time.

In describing one of these cases, Dr. Edward Huntington Williams and Clifford A. Wright, Los Angeles, Cal., in Clinical Medicine and Surgery state: "Miss A., aged 16, became listless, indifferent, and depressed; assumed fixed and strained postures; long periods and sleep without emotion or cause. Her mental processes were slow (she was naturally quick and alert), dull and fazed; she was irritable at times and became vacant; hands cool and clammy; blood pressure low (rate at which body processes worked (metabolism) was 20 percent below normal).

She was then given thyroid pituitary, and ovarian extracts. "By the end of the third week a great improvement was noted and blood pressure higher, hands and feet warmer, no depression. At the end of two months she was transformed from a sad, white faced, slow-moving, dazed and depressed young woman who appeared ten years older than her actual age into a cheerful, happy, normal, vivacious girl."

This and other cases described by these two physicians should make parents consider the family doctor early when they notice definite change in behavior in their boys and girls.
