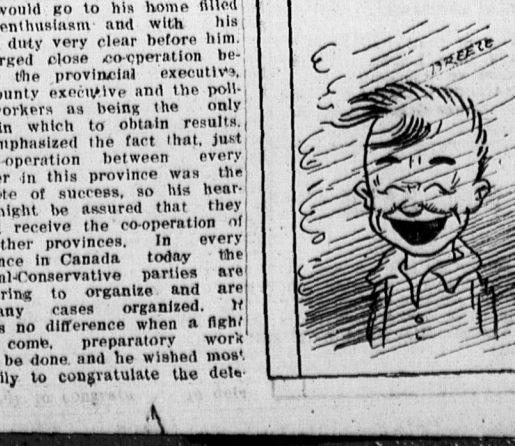
ADDRESS BY MR. DOUGLAS
