The delegates gave short reports of their schools.

Marshfield has an average attendance of 40 and continues in session all the year. The parents are attending in larger numbers. Had a normal class part of last year.

The York school also continues during the entire year, last winter being the first winter in which they succeeded in keeping open. This school also had a normal class part of the year and intend to continue the normal lessons this year.

The Pleasant Grove school was lately reorganized by Rev. T. Hicks and is doing splendid work with a membership of thirty-five.

The school at Union Road was reported by Jas. Essory, who spoke of the ability of the teachers. This school continues all year.

Mr. Wm. Pierce gave a written report of the Brackley School. This school is open only six months, there are seven officers and teachers with an average attendance of 26.

Mr. Charles Bryanton has been superintendent of the South Winsloe school about twenty-five years. He reported that the school is open all the year, and has always been an evergreen school.

The remainder of the time was spent in open conference on Sunday school methods. Rev. Mr. Bradshaw showed how Missionary information could be given the young by a well selected library with books on the lives of missionaries, and by the use of maps in the school. The Field Secretary spoke for a few moments of the objects of the Provincial Association of which the District Associations are parts.

At the evening session a large audience gathered. A united choir of the different communities rendered excellent music, and bouquets of flowers also assisted by their freshness and beauty, in success of the meeting. Devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. T. Hicks. The minutes of the afternoon session were read by the Secretary.

It was decided to hold the next convention in the Presbyterian Church at Marshfield on some date in February to be decided by the Executive Committee.

The President gave a few good and well worded thoughts on the value of Bible study for our present good and our future happiness.

Mr. James Essery extended a welcome to the visiting delegates, and to the visiting ministers, for their attendance and help. Mr. Bert Brown of York, and Mr. L. Foster of Marshfield, replied fittingly to the address of welcome. Mr. Foster stated that this was the first Sunday School convention he had attended, but it would not be the last, for he had received valuable help and encouragement by being present.

The choir then sang an appropriate piece, after which the audience was privileged to hear from the Provincial President, Rev. D. B. McLeod, who encouraged the Sunday School workers to persevere in their high calling. By invitation of the President of the District, Rev. F. G. Bradshaw sang a song in the Chinese language, which, though not understood, seemed to be enjoyed by the audience.

Rev. Mr. Parkins of Winsloe, gave an interesting address, basing his remarks upon the charge of Paul to Timothy to stir up the gifts that was in him.

The Field Secretary spoke at some length upon the place of Bible study in the formation of character, and with the assistance of the ministers answered the questions which were handed in.

Rev. F. J. Bradshaw spoke briefly but effectively on the necessity of having a missionary spirit in all our Sunday School work and the reasons for this necessity were:

1st. That we might understand the meaning of the Bible.

2nd. That we might be in sympathy with the author of the Bible.

3rd. That we might be in closer touch with Christ and his purposes concerning the world.

4th. That we might be encouraged as we witnessed the fulfilment of prophecy and the progress of the Kingdom.

The convention was a decided success and all present were conscious that much good could be accomplished by united effort of the churches in this meeting together to discuss the ways and means of increasing the efficiency of our schools. An offering of \$2.67 was taken for expenses of the District Secretary and for Provincial work.
