dress of the President of the Bank of Montreal at the Bank's annual meeting.

How much good sense and judgment there is in that statement, and how seldom you see it put into practice. With a great many people the idea of prosperity is to get something out of somebody else, for nothing.

With the local Government, the main idea seems to be to get money out of the Dominion Government. Don't encourage enterprise or industry, but just "get it out of them", act the gold-digger in fact.

But when it comes to their real chef d'oeuvre, the highest finesses of their skill, they take the money out of their poor, helpless, thirsty fellow men; by selling them liquor and then fining them for drinking it, they get them both coming and going.

In conversation with a certain gentleman, we were interested to hear his opinion of the industries that might profitably be started on the Island: A boot and shoe factory (we used to have one as a matter of fact) a pork and bean canner and a barrel making plant were among the industries suggested. However, it is easier just to import liquor and sell it, the Government believe in following the line of least resistance.

That is the trouble. Temperance people of Prince Edward Island, we haven't offered enough resistance. As a matter of fact, the Government intimidated as much on one occasion when some members of the temperance Federation tried to appeal to their sense of duty with regard to the liquor question. They said: "The other side make more noise than you do", or words to that effect. There it is. With them, the wheel that squeaks is the one that gets the grease. Considerations of discharging their duty, of preserving democracy unimpaired, of the welfare of the people are relegated to second place. The thing that appeals to them is resistance, and that we must offer; of course, non-violent resistance. "Ye have not yet resisted unto blood," whereas we should have resisted unto death. The point is that the policy of the Government is founded on violation of law. Therefore, we must resist this policy with all in order to be law-abiding citizens, our might. -Edith Sterns.

"BRICKS WITHOUT STRAW"

When some one says (as someone is always sure to say when asked for money to carry on temperance work, educational, propaganda, legislative) "When you temperance people show us what you are accomplishing, we will be ready to contribute."

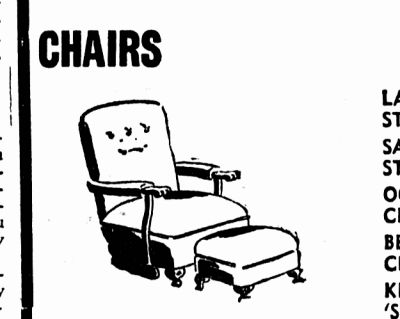

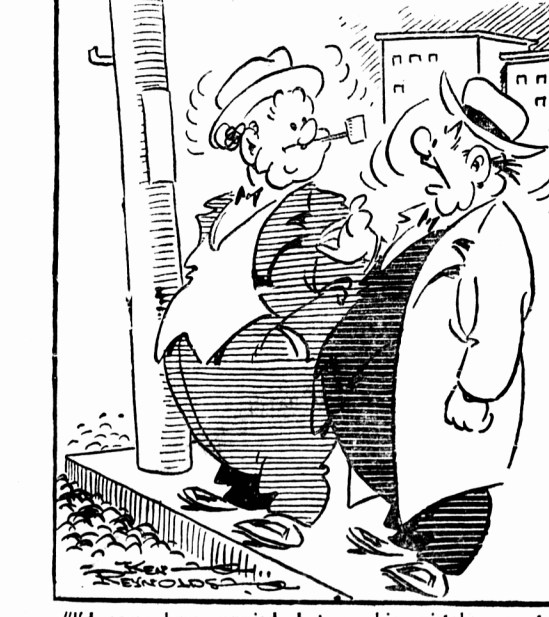
