Feller Fails To Go Route Against Tigers; Dean Hangs Up 12th Pitching Victory

IN THIS CORNER

Things haven't been running any too smoothly in the junior baseball league lately and yesterday saw the climax reached when Esquires failed to put in an appearance for their scheduled encounter with the Canadians.

While teams have been voicing dissatisfaction over playing dates, players, etc. for the past several weeks and threatening all sorts of moves the executive got together Saturday night and as a result of the meeting it was felt that things had been smoothed out to everybody's satisfaction at least until Tuesday when another meeting was to be held.

Evidently some of the players held different ideas on the matter. According to the Esquires' manager yesterday, in conversation with President Byron Brown, several of his players refused to take part in the game, apparently they only reason being that they desired to play the Dodgers instead of the Canadians.

There may or may not be another reason for their action but whether there is or not isn't going to help the league any. The quicker the players learn to abide by league rulings the better it will be for everybody concerned. After all, what is the sense of appointing a slate of officers if players are going to take matters into their own hands whenever a ruling is not to one hundred percent to their liking.

Decisions handed down by ruling officers of any league are not always perfect but usually they work out all right in the end. In this case Esquires' demands for more Sunday games was met with; they were originally scheduled to play tonight. Their request was met and then they fail to show up all of which makes their action more harder to understand.

For the sake of the league which has been steadily gaining in popularity it is to be hoped that today's meeting will see the matter cleared up to everybody's satisfaction. This season is the first time that junior ball has been played on an organized basis and it would be a pity if it were to be ruined just for the sake of a few mere trivialities.

What has happened to Hubbell? That's what all the baseball fans were asking when King Carl, his winning streak halted at twenty-four games, slumped into four consecutive losses. Rube Marquard, pitching star of a former era, who hung up the record for consecutive pitching victories in one season at nineteen, thinks he has the answer. "Hubbell's arm is tired from too much bearing down. I know all about it. I felt that way myself. Of course, Hubbell's streak and mine are a little different. Carl won his last 16 in 1936 and added more to the string this year before Brooklyn stopped him. I won mine all in one year. But Carl had as much pressure on him in those first 8 this year as I had in 1912.

"Carl was seeing how far he could go without being beaten. So was I. We had to pitch a little bit harder with each new game because the other teams were trying their hardest to beat us. It meant a lot of publicity for any club that could do it.

Feller, making his first start since April 24, went four innings before Mel Harder replaced him. In those four innings Feller struck out four men, gave up one hit and four walks, made an error, and let in three unearned runs, which proved enough to win the game for Detroit.

"I threw it away," Feller said afterward. Manager Steve O'Neill announced the 18-year-old Iowan would take his regular turn on the mound hereafter.

Gomez Blanks Senators

Vernon (Lefty) Gomez of the league leading Yankees pitched five hit ball to shut out Senators 7-0 in Washington.

Gomez limited the Senators to two hits for seven innings and topped his pitching performance with a single which drove in two runs.

Monty Stratton and Ted Lyons limited the Browns to eight hits and Chicago White Sox captured both games of a double-header in St. Louis 4-2 and 9-3.

The Browns matched the White Sox his in the first game, but home runs by Zeke Bonura and Mike Kreevich gave Chicago the contest.

In the second game, Dixie Walker homered for the Sox in the third, driving in two runs ahead of him.

Red Sox Down A's

Boston Red Sox took two games from Philadelphia Athletics for their 15th triumph in the last 17 home games.

Splendid relief pitching by Jack Wilson saved the first game in the ninth inning.

Archie (Lefty) McKain came to the rescue of Buck Newom in the ninth, as the Sox won 4-2.

Yankees squeezed over a run in the ninth inning Saturday to defeat Washington 5-4.

Chicago defeated St. Louis 10-5 while Detroit beat Cleveland 9-5 and Boston Red Sox smacked out an 8-3 win over Philadelphia.

NATIONAL LEAGUE

NEW YORK, July 4—Van Lingle Mungo had the Giants eating out of his hand for six innings today, but he put on a display of batting fireworks in the seventh and eighth innings to score all their runs and top Brooklyn Dodgers 6-5.

For six innings, Mungo blanked the National League champions with one hit, and coasted along on a five-run lead, which was piled up with the aid of Cookie Lavagetto's two homers, in the fourth and sixth frames.

In the seventh, however, the Giants found the range and scored their first two runs, and in the eighth they belted Mungo out, scored four runs and put the game on ice.

Boston Bees made it 9 victories in their last 10 starts when they swept both ends of a double header with the Phillies. The scores were 14-9 in the first game and 4-2 in the second which went 10 innings.

12th Victory for Dean

St. Louis defeated the Reds twice in Cincinnati, taking a six-inning rain sweep, tonight, 5-2 after Dizzy Dean hurled a 1-0 victory in the opener for his 12th win of the season.

Lon Warneke held the Reds to four scattered blows in the finale, while his mates were clubbing Ray Davis and Bill Hallahan for 12 hits.

Johnny Mize had a perfect mark in three trips to the plate, and a record of four-in-seven for the day.

Cubs Split Doubleheader

After huddling in the stands a full hour during a first-inning rainstorm, a capacity 36,744 Chicago crowd was treated to six hours of spectacular baseball as the Cubs bombed Cy Blanton from the mound to defeat Pittsburgh 8-5 in the opener. The Cubs lost the second game 7-6 when a ninth inning rally fell short with the tying run on third base.

The opening victory, aided by homers by Frank Demaree, Rip Collins and pitcher Curt Davis, extended the Chicagoans' winning streak to six games.

Pep Young, Pirate third sacker, hit a homer in each game, while Gus Suhr also hit for the circuit in the second game.

Cubs hammered out five runs in the first inning against Pittsburgh Saturday and went on to win 10-5. Giants dropped their first decision in seven starts when they lost 7-4 to Boston Bees.

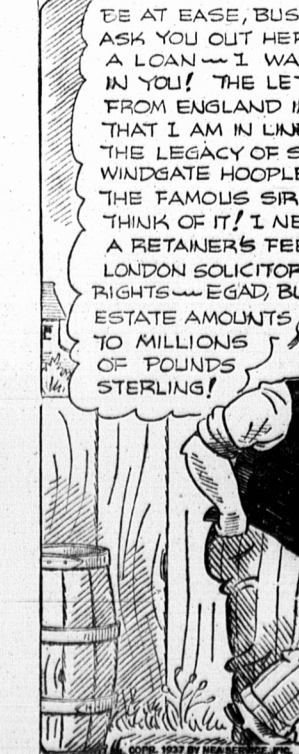

Tolmich Leads Assault On Track & Field Records

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MILWAUKEE, July 4—Allan Tolmich from Detroit's Wayne University, whipped a world champion, set a meet record and outshone a field of brilliant stars in the golden jubilee renewal of the United States Amateur Athletic Union's senior track and field championship meet.

Glenn Cunningham, retained the 1,500 metres title; four far westerners surpassed the accepted world pole vault record, and six great negro jumpers dominated their field—but it was Tolmich who out-sparked them all.

Tolmich whipped Georgia's famous Forrest (Spee) Towns, world record-holder, Olympic champion, defending titleholder and regarded as unbeatable in the high hurdles, over the 110-metre route in 14.5. It was Tolmich who came

Top-ranking Tennis Players In Ottawa For Tournament

OTTAWA, July 4—(CP)—Top-ranking tennis players of Ontario and Quebec were ready tonight for the first round play tomorrow in the Ontario championships on the courts of the Rideau Tennis Club.

Ross Wilson, Toronto, who won the Quebec City invitation tournament last week and toured South America last winter, was installed as favorite to take the title. But he was promised plenty of opposition, chiefly from Roland Longin of Montreal who ranks third in Canada, one peg below Wilson and the two Montreals who have campaigned in Europe the past two years, Bob Murray and Laird Watt.

Field Of 260 Entered In British Open

(By Scotty Reston, Associated Press Sports Writer) CARNOSTE, Scotland, July 4—The most notable golf field in recent years converged upon a bleak, brown heath in this Scottish seaside village tonight to battle for Alf Padgham's British open crown.

The field of 260, including 11 former champions, 19 Americans, and the best players Europe can produce, will play the first qualifying round tomorrow over the neighboring Carnoustie and Burnside courses. The second 16-hole qualifying test is scheduled Tuesday with the low 140 players and those tied for 140th place entering the 72-hole championship proper Wednesday.

Everybody rested today as for the fourth straight day, a wind-driven rain lashed the course. The storm blew over huge refreshment and exhibition tents near the clubhouse and scattered debris on the course.

The course, built on a sandy stretch near the sea, was full of puddles. Though rain pelted down and fog closed in, there was no indication the championship would not start at 9 a. m. (6 a. m. A. D. T.)

In an international field it appeared doubtful if Great Britain, relying almost entirely upon Henry Cotton, could withstand the threat of the American professionals, who as a group were quoted as even money to win.

Toney Manero, 1936 U. S. open champion, and the veteran Walter Hagen, non-playing captain of the Ryder Cup team, play at Burnside, starting at 9 a. m.

Henry Cotton ruled co-favorite with Ralph Guldahl, United States open champion, at 7 to 1. Denny Shute, former champion, was next at 8 to 1. Most of the other British and American Ryder Cup stars were bracketed at 12 to 1.

Dorothy Round Re-captures Wimbledon Singles Title; Budge Pulls "Hat Trick"

P. by Guardian's Special Wire) WIMBLEDON, Eng., July 4—Don Budge completed the greatest personal triumph in Wimbledon's long history Saturday when, with some lively assistance from his fellow-Californians, Gene Mako and Alice Marble, he added the men's doubles and mixed doubles championships to the singles crown he won Friday.

The Oakland, Calif., red-heads dominance of the closing day's play overshadowed Dorothy Round's victory over Jadwiga Jędrzejowska of Poland, 6-2, 6-2, 7-5, in the women's singles final.

Teamed with Mako, Budge defeated England's Davis Cup pair, George Patrick Hughes and Clifford R. D. Tuckey, to win the men's doubles crown at 6-0, 6-4, 6-8, 6-1. A little later, Budge partnered Miss Marble, United States women's titleholder, to an easy 6-4, 6-1 triumph over Yvon Petra and Mme. Simone Mathieu of France for the mixed doubles championship.

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How They Stand Cubs Losing Streak

Cubs snapped out of their six-game losing streak in the Midwest Softball League when they defeated the Glants 10-3 yesterday afternoon in the first game of a double-header bill.

With all the scoring taking place in the early innings Cubs held their lead in the last four frames as both teams came through with the finest fielding efforts yet displayed in the league.

In the second game of the twin bill Reg Whitlock's Rovers managed to keep their unbeaten record intact, beating the All-Stars 20-19 in a free hitting contest.

It was a close call for the Rovers, however. Going into the eighth they trailed their opponents 16-9 but a nine run attack in that session followed by two more runs in the ninth gave them that narrow margin of victory; the best their opponents could do was score three runs in their last two times at the plate being retired in the ninth with the tying run on second base.

The loser had a grand total of 47 points out of the contest. The winners scored on 15 placements in all.

Miss Round, who de-throned Helen Jacobs in the quarter-finals of the tournament just ended, decided finally not to play in the Wightman Cup matches at Forest Hills Aug. 20-21 despite all the plea of the British Cup Committee.

She is to be married to Dr. Douglas L. Little in September and decided after today's match to stick by her original plan to pass up the Wightman Cup matches in favor of wedding preparations.

The fifth of Wimbledon's championships, the women's doubles went to Mme. Mathieu and Bils Yorke of England who trounced Mrs. Phyllis Mudford King and Joan Pittman of England, 6-3, 6-2.

Wayne Sabin, young Hollywood, Calif., player defeated Norma G. Farquharson of South Africa, 6-2, 6-3, in the finals for the consolation singles plate.

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
