**FATHER GOPON.**

All will remember the priest who led the multitude of workmen in the streets of St. Petersburg on a memorable Sunday a few weeks ago, when they went to petition the Czar for redress of their wrongs and were shot down like wild beasts. Father Gopon, as he is called, seems to have believed that if the people could once reach the ear of the Czar instead of the official cordon which surrounds him, justice would be done. But when hundreds were shot down on his right hand and on his left and he alone of the front rank left unscathed, his entire nature seems to have changed. He has become the rankest of revolutionists, and from his secret hiding place he has since issued a series of most inflammatory letters, or proclamations to the people of Russia.

In the first of these letters he utters his "pastoral curse" against those soldiers and officers who are engaged in shooting down their brothers, with their wives and children, and he absolves all soldiers from their oath to support the "traitorous Czar." Here is an extract from a short address he has issued to the factory operatives: "Weep not for the slain heroes. Be comforted. Beaten we have been, but not conquered. Let us tear up all portraits of the bloodthirsty Czar, and say to him: Be thou accursed with all thy most reptile blood." The third and longest letter recites the circumstances of their attempt to have an interview with the Czar, declares that the bullets have killed their faith in the Autocrat, promises vengeance and death for the Czar and "all his imperial, reptilian blood," and his ministers as well, and summons the people, thinking men, students, the Revolutionists and Socialists to lend a hand. "He who is not with the people is against the people," writes Father Gopon. How much better it would have been for the Czar to have listened to the people than to have shot them down! Father Gopon would then have been a good friend. He is now evidently a dangerous enemy.

The C. B. C. Recorder remarks that "today the brains of some of our prominent and far-seeing men are waxing hot, advocating a tunnel. . . Those who fight with success for this cause will bestow a merciful kindness on unborn generations for which they will be duly grateful."

After all, why should the steamer captains, or the Marine Department need to be spurred on by the press or the Board of Trade? It is the duty of the Dominion, its ministers and officials to keep the communication open. When the Government organ calls for the Board of Trade to take action, what is but a confession of official slackness?

We commend The Patriot for having adopted The Guardian's claim for a third and more powerful winter steamer, and also in recommending the Board of Trade here to again take in hand the matter of getting the ice blockade broken. We doubt not that The Patriot will yet become an advocate of the tunnel, (when forced by public opinion to take that course) and then we shall expect it to assume the air and manner of the original and chief promoter of that enterprise.

We have printed of late a number of letters suggesting new routes for the winter steamers, and enforcing the demand for a new and more powerful ice breaking steamer. All these suggestions are of interest and more or less valuable. The best means for keeping communication open should be had at any cost. A more powerful steamer should be ready for next winter's navigation. We look to the tunnel as the ultimate and only satisfactory solution of our winter communication. But as it must take years to construct that work after it is once begun we must depend upon steamers in the meantime. And we cannot tolerate such interruptions as are inevitable under present conditions.

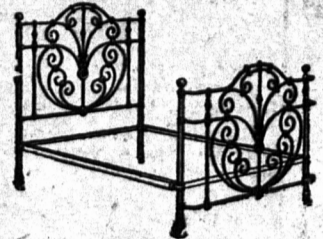
