### PROVINCIALIST PASSES AWAY.

#### IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.

On Saturday last Kenneth Martin left this city for the purpose of joining Mrs. Martin who went there three weeks ago on a visit to her mother. When he left here he was the picture of health, and almost anyone would have taken a guess on his life for at least a quarter of a century. On Tuesday the surprising news came that he had been seized with a sudden illness while travelling between Everett and Bellingham and had been taken to the hospital at Bellingham. He had lost his reason and seemed to imagine that he was still in Rossland. It was stated that the physicians in the hospital diagnosed the condition in which he was in as the result of kidney disease. On Wednesday the community was shocked by a telegram from Bellingham stating that he had died at 7 o'clock on that morning. The funeral is to be held in Vancouver on Sunday. S. L. and Mrs. Williams, brother-in-law and sister of the deceased left this city for Vancouver on Thursday for the purpose of attending the funeral.

Mr. Martin is a son of Malcolm Martin of Heatherdale, and was born on May 27th, 1874, at Heatherdale, Prince Edward Island. Fourteen years ago, about the time he attained his majority, he came West and lived in Butte and other towns in Montana for five years, working as a miner in Butte and other mining camps.

Nine years ago he came to Rossland, and for several years was employed in the mines here, and was a prominent member of the Miners' Union, was a leader in its councils, and in the year 1904 was president and honored with different offices of the union. About four years since he and a partner leased the Orwell hotel. Shortly afterwards he purchased his partner's interest and has been the sole proprietor since. He was an ardent Liberal and always took a prominent part in campaigns, civic, provincial and Dominion. For several years past he has been a member of the executive of the local Liberal Association, and during the recent Dominion campaign he was chairman of the association and was a hard worker in Smith Curtis' interest.

On September 15th, 1908, he was married to Miss Agnes Martine, daughter of John and Mrs. Jeanne Martin of Vancouver. Mr. Martin was a man of more than ordinary force of character and whatever cause he espoused he did it with all his strength, and as a result of this characteristic, he had many friends. There was no doubting his position on any question that concerned the union, the Liberal party or the City of Rossland, and once he took a stand that he thought was right, he would not leave it.

He was a loyal friend, a public-spirited citizen, a kind and indulgent husband, and faithful, true and honest in his dealings with his fellow-men, and this city's loss by his death is a great one. The entire

community will mourn his untimely demise and its united sympathy will go out to the young widow, who, in Vancouver, is deeply grieved over her much beloved husband's death. Rossland, B. C., Miner.

The funeral took place from the residence of John Martin, father-in-law of the deceased, where Presbyterian services were held.

The fraternal Order of Eagles and the Knights of Pythias, to which the late Mr. Martin belonged, conducted the services at the grave. A large number attended the funeral, and floral offerings were numerous.
