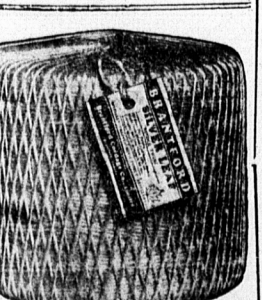

Stock Prices Drift Lower In New York

(By FREDERICK GARDNER) (Associated Press Financial Writer) NEW YORK, Aug. 14 (CP)—The Stock Market kept its score-board free of hits this week and Saturday for the sixth consecutive session, ended on the losing side. While pressure lessened appreciably against leading issues, and declines on the whole were confined to minor fractions, intermittent rallying attempts met with only feeble response. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks yielded 2 of a point at 47, a low since July 11, the week's drop of 3.5 points was the largest since the period of March 23. The rush for gold abroad emphasized the nervousness over a possible German-Czechoslovak flare-up and the price of the metal in London was lifted to a record peak. Engagements of \$9,000,000 of gold at London for shipment to the United States was announced, the largest from any country for any day since June 10, 1937. Leading foreign currencies, though, exhibited a relatively steady tone in terms of the United States dollar, but during the week sterling and the french franc dipped to new lows for the move. Activity was dull among Canadian stocks, with gains outdoing losses. Dome Mines, International Nickel, McIntyre, and Lake Shore all improved fractionally while Distillers-Segramans and Imperial Tobacco eased.

Currencies

NEW YORK, Aug. 14 (AP)—Foreign exchange dealings were at slower pace Saturday. Sterling and the French franc held relatively steady, though money traders kept a close watch for developments touching Czechoslovakia. Demand for gold in London, however, capping a week of heavy buying, showed only few signs of the metal may be profitably shipped to the United States. The British pound remained unchanged at 4.87 1/4 while the French franc, beset alike by international developments and internal unsettlement, dipped .00 1-8 of a cent to 2.72 3/8. The Canadian dollar was up 1-32 of a cent at 99 15-32.

MONTREAL, Aug. 14 (CP)—Butter prices closed easier Saturday on the produce section of the Canadian commodity exchange, 1-4 cent lower, bringing the week's loss to 1-2 cents. MINING

TORONTO, Aug. 14 (CP)—Low volume, the smallest since May 28 marked the Toronto exchange trading in Saturday's session and indicated nervousness among traders resulting from the repeated war scares. Industrial and base metal shares weakened and the gold and western oils posted moderate net gains. Only 251,000 shares were traded. Strength of bar gold indirectly helped the big golds and most of the senior listings firmed narrowly. Dome added a half point and Lake Shore 3-8. McIntyre and Hollinger closed unchanged. Action in Preston slowed down and the price closed unchanged at 1-68. Kerr-Adison had a run up to 2-15 but failed to hold the gain. Hard Rock moved in volume at a gain of 5 cents and the close was up a few cents for Brasorne, Central Patricia, East Malartic, Jellicoe, Sylvanite, Wright-Hargreaves and Chibougamau, Chesterville, Pamour, Pickle Crow and the Hughes were down.

In Memoriam

MRS. JANE ELIZABETH HARRIS. Passing away at three o'clock Friday morning, July 15th, in her eighty-fifth year, Mrs. Jane Elizabeth Harris, who is well known in Charlottetown, P. E. I. An only daughter, Sadie Matheson, R.N., passed away some years ago. A beloved niece, Miss Sadie MacGregor, of the High School staff, Providence, R.I., arriving in Windsor last Friday to spend part of her vacation, was grieved and shocked to learn that her aunt had passed away that morning. Since her marriage with Mr. James E. Harris, the deceased lady had resided in Windsor at their home on King Street, with the adopted daughter, Katie Ellis, a niece of the first Mrs. Harris. Following the death of Miss Ellis, Mrs. Harris failed in health. For two years she had been an invalid, being tenderly cared for by Miss Mary MacKeel, R.N., whose devotion to her friend could not have been surpassed by a daughter for a much loved mother. During her mature life Mrs. Harris had rendered a conscientious service to the cause of temperance. For many years she was the esteemed president of the local W.C.T.U. and had frequently served officially in the work of the Provincial W.C.T.U. fund. Sunday afternoon service was held at the home conducted by the Rev. G. N. Hamilton. Members of the choir of Trinity and Presbyterian Churches furnished favourite hymns when "Bury My Soul" and "Rock of Ages" were sung. Early Monday morning the remains of the deceased were taken by Mayor Lohnes to Charlottetown for interment in the Matheson family lot in the People's Cemetery. A service was held at the grave conducted by the Rev. Mr. Miller of the United Church, Charlottetown. Mrs. Harris was the daughter of the late Malcolm and Jean Cameron MacRae of Charlottetown and with the exception of her twin sister, Miss Sara MacRae, was the last of a highly respected family in the Garden of the Gulf. The many lovely floral tributes testified to the high esteem in which Mrs. Harris was held by her many friends and in the life of the community.

Losses Are Recorded On Montreal Mart

MONTREAL, Aug. 14 (CP)—The storm of selling orders abated somewhat on the Stock Exchange Saturday but not before a few substantial losses had been set up. Most equipments drifted to the easy side of the list, Canadian Dominion Steel and Coal "B" 1-8 point lower. National Steel Car rallied after opening a half point down to close a point higher at 59. Noranda took another spill, dropping 1-2 points with Nickel 1-4 lower. Smelters, however, gained a point. The new Bridge was a heavy loser, dropping two points just before the close. Other constructions improved, Foundation up a half and Cement 1-4. Utilities succumbed to the selling pressure after having held up fairly well during the early part of this week's decline. Total sales, \$0,500 shares; industrial 10,100; mines 30,400; bonds \$550.
