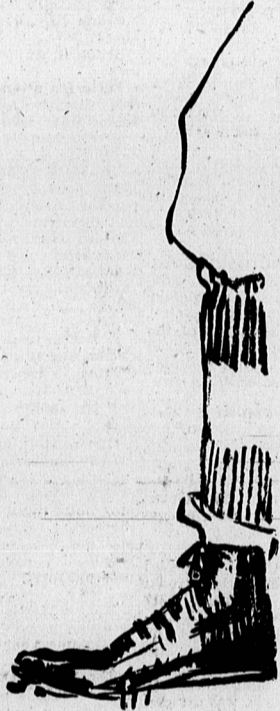

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EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the P. E. Island Egg Laying Contest for the 37th Week Ending July 10th, 1927

Mr. H. C. Muttart's B. R. hen led the Contest for the week with 56 points. Mr. Everett Howatt's W. L. hen are 2nd with 53.4 points. Mrs. Milton Waye's B. R. are third with 50.4 points. Mrs. J. F. Easton's W. L. are 4th with 48.7 points. Mr. Glen McLaren's are 5th with 47.7 points. Mrs. A. Hamilton's B. R. are 6th with 44.2 points. Mr. Clifford McEwen's B. R. are 7th with 43.7 points. Mr. M. Cutcliffe's B. R. are 8th with 43.6 points. Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B. R. are 9th with 43.3 points and Mr. William Coughlan's B. R. are 10th with 42.4 points.

Mr. H. C. Muttart's four hens numbers 97, 99, 94 and 95 lead the Contest with 209.4, 202.7, 191.4 and 191.1 points. Mrs. A. Hamilton's hen No. 206 is 5th with 185.7 points. Mr. Clifford McEwen's hen No. 126 is 6th with 176.5 points. Mr. W. W. Crosby's hen No. 83 is 7th with 175.6 points. Mrs. J. F. Easton's hen No. 22 is 8th with 174.6 points. Mr. Clifford McEwen's hen No. 127 is 9th with 172.3 points and Mr. V. R. Ross's hen No. 198 is 10th with 172.1 points.

The Contest made a gain of 23 eggs during the week, the total being 823. The total number of eggs laid to date is 24282.

Rigid Potato Certification Standards

In view of the several complaints received from Southern growers during the Spring of this year who used Certified Seed Potatoes grown in Prince Edward Island, the Department of Agriculture has obtained and planted a series of twenty-three different samples of Certified Potatoes selected at random from the storages in Virginia and representing the exact type planted in the South about which complaints were made. These potatoes have been planted in the usual manner at Charlottetown, P. E. I., and have been carefully examined by the Dominion Botanist and his inspection staff with the result that the germination of these tubers has been determined throughout to be not less than 98.8 per cent. Moreover

the stand obtained is perfect from the point of disease freedom. In view, however, of the complaints made, the Inspection Service is determined in the interest of the future of the Certified Seed Potato Industry of the Island to certify no field of potatoes in the Island not in every respect suitable to maintain the reputation of the Service, the strict inspectors are hereby instructed to pass no field for certification unless showing not less than 90 per cent of a stand that will qualify according to the standards set for certification. That is to say fields with Misses amounting to more than 10 per cent will be disqualified as well as fields showing less than 10 per cent Misses providing the stand is uneven and showing weak hills of any kind. It is hoped that every conscientious grower of the Island will support this attitude and continue thus to aid in the further advancement of an industry which has proved its great value to the entire province. It must be remembered that we can only hope to retain our present markets and make progress in new ones by the supply of Seed Potatoes that cannot be surpassed anywhere else.
