American Leaguers Win 5-2 Victory In All-Star Encounter

ST. LOUIS, July 13 — (AP) — Vic Raschi, newcomer to the All-Star ranks, slugged and pitched the injury-riddled American Leaguers to a 5-2 victory over their "cousins" from the National League today to take an 11-4 edge in the lop-sided series.

Raschi, powerful 28-year-old righthander from manager Buckey Harris' own New York Yankee staff, came through with a two-run single that broke a fourth-inning tie.

Then he rounded out three scoreless innings by striking out rookie Richie Ashburn of the Phillies with the bases loaded in the sixth inning.

Raschi's performance was the highlight of this festival of torn muscles and frayed tempers that passed for the 15th All-Star contest. A capacity crowd of 34,039 paid a net gate of \$93,447 into the players' pension fund.

The victim of Raschi's tie-breaking single was Johnny Schmitz of Chicago Cubs, second of four National League pitchers. Schmitz was tagged with the loss.

Schmitz took over in the fourth inning with the score tied. He retired the first man who faced him but dished out singles to Ken Keltner and George McQuinn before walking Birdie Tebbetts to lead the bases.

Raschi then came up to hit for himself. He lashed a liner into left field for the blow that put his side ahead to stay.

Schmitz, who had followed a three-inning stint by Brooklyn's Ralph Branca, gave way to Johnny Gain of Boston. Joe Dimaggio, kept out of the starting line-up by a leg injury, then scored Tebbetts from third with the final run of the game on an outfield fly.

Ewell Blackwell of Cincinnati replaced Sain and hurried shutout ball the rest of the way. His effort was matched by Joe Coleman of Philadelphia, who came on to hurl the last three frames for the American League.

Dimaggio swung into action as pinch-hitters or runners. Ted Williams of Boston, who was not supposed to swing a bat, walked as a pinch batsman. Detroit's ailing Hal Newhouser, burst in and all, ran for him.

The old American League whammy seemed to have lost its power in the first inning when Musial bounced his long drive. Ashburn had nicked the bespectacled Masterson for an infield "leg single" to lead off the ball game. Even after Musial's bell, Masterson still was not out of the woods. Johnny Mize singled and Enos Slaughter walked but he weathered the storm.

Back came the Americans with a run in the second inning on a home run drive by Detroit's Hoot Evers off starter Branca.

Branca, who started out like a ball of fire by whiffing the first two men to face him, ran into heavy going in the third due to a wild streak.

BISLEY CAMP, Eng., July 13 — (CP) — Canadians lost out in the two tie shoot-offs for which they qualified today, as the empire meeting of the National Rifle Association cleaned up shoot-offs in preparation for tomorrow's first stage of the classic King's prize.

The tie-shoots in several competitions cleared the decks for all marksmen to enter the first stage of the King's tomorrow at 200, 300 and 600 yards. Only the top 300 scorers tomorrow qualify for the second stage, Friday, which ends the field to the King's hundred for the final on Saturday.

Canadians who qualified with top scores were beaten today in the shoot-offs for the Conan Doyle challenge statuette and the Daily Mail prize.

These were the tie-shoot results:

In the Daily Mail, Lieut. W. Blackman of the Royal Sussex regiment won with a score of 74 out of a possible 75. Major A.E. Gormley of Charlottetown tied with H.M. Natt, a farmer who is member of the Australian rifle team, for eighth place.

In the Conan Doyle tie shoot for the Conan Doyle challenge statuette Maj. F.B. Smith of Perth, Scotland, fired five consecutive bull's eyes. Maj. Gormley of Charlottetown tied for fifth.

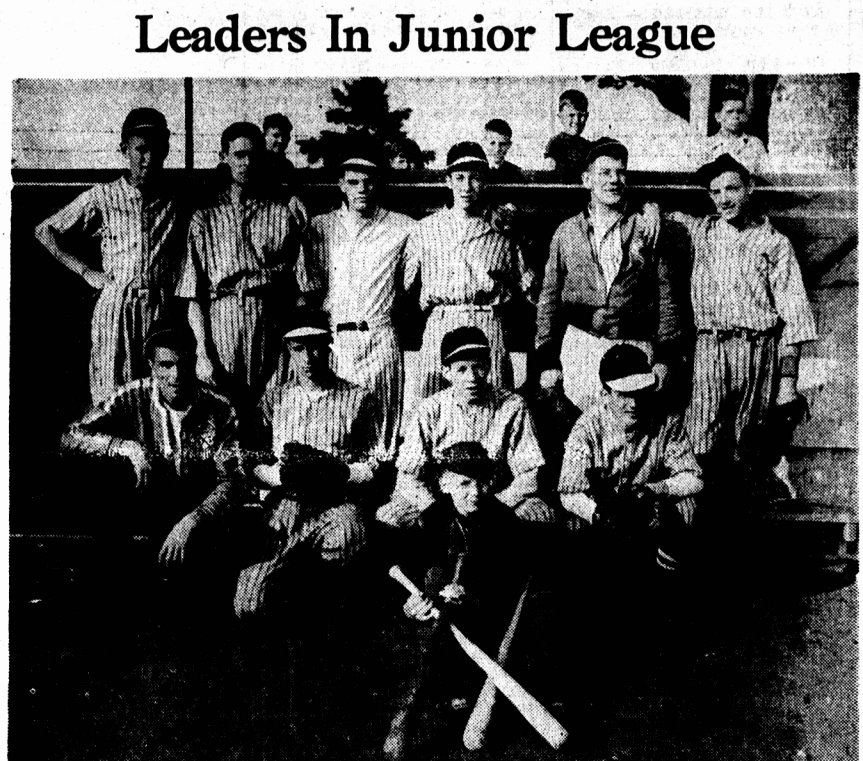

Top-seeded Montreal stars, Henri Rochon, defending champion, Brendan Macken, and Rene Buser, closed singles titleholder, won third-round matches with ease. Two other Montrealsers seeded in the top seven, Jean-Jacques Desjardins and Jean Richer, also advanced to quarter-finals.

Jack Hopkins of Kew Gardens Club, Toronto, playing a steady game throughout, upset Jean Marois of Quebec, seeded seventh, 8-6, 8-6. Hopkins' victory sent him smack up against Rochon in the quarter-finals.

Lorne Main, Canadian junior champion of Vancouver, met unexpectedly stiff opposition from an unseeded Quebec player, 35-year-old Gaston Blouin. Main, seeded fourth, lost a grueling first set 10-12, won the second, 7-5, and breezed to an easy 6-2 victory in the deciding set.

Patricia Macken, Mrs. Pauline Laquerre and Francoise Lacasse won third-round matches in straight sets to move into semi-finals with Miss Filides thus making the battle for the women's singles crown an all-Montreal affair.

Miss Filides was all-out in turning back the challenge of diminutive Claire Renshaw of Montreal, former Canadian girls and junior champion. Miss Renshaw forced a third set by capturing the second 6-4 after dropping the first 6-3. Miss Filides won the third 7-5.

Air Force Veteran Springs Big Surprise In Golf Ch'ship

HAMILTON, July 13 — (CP) — Ken Ward, a 30-year-old air force veteran, gave the Canadian Amateur Golf Championship its most stunning upset today.

The tall, gangling player from Montreal Summerlee knocked Sles Riegel, United Skates amateur champion out of the competition in the first round, with a victory on the 16th hole after Riegel had fought his way from behind a three-hole deficit to square the match at the 18th.

There were also other surprises in the long day of golf which started at 8 A.M. and went on until dusk. There were 108 matches — 44 in a preliminary and 64 in a first round — to cut the field to 64 from a record 172 for the second round tomorrow morning.

Three Nova Scotians advanced to the second round — Ed Crowell of Halifax and Red Joudrey and A.W. Carter of Dartmouth. Crowell defeated T. Durnach, 6 and 5. Carter downed Jerry Jacobs, Toronto 6 and 3, and 2.

Ralph Harley of Moncton, N.B., also advanced, defeating Dr. A.W. Matthews, Toronto Rosedale, 4 and 3.

A number of Maritimers were beaten, however. L. Beatty of Woodstock, N.B., went down before Jack Kenney of London Highland 3 and 2. E. Cleworth of Dartmouth, N.S., was beaten by I. Thompson of Dundas, Ont., 5 and 3.

Lorne Smith of Dartmouth was beaten by A.J. Turney of Montreal Marlborough, 6 and 4. C. Dowling of Charlottetown went down before Murray Norman of Kitchener took a record score, went down to defeat. One was Jim Robertson, who set a new record for individual medal play over the 36 holes in the Willingdon, and bowed out of the amateur today, 3 and 2, to R.B. Pritchard of Montreal.

Percy Clogg went down, by two holes, to Bruce Dorman of Hamilton. Doug McKellar of Oakville, Ont., knocked Bill Mackinney, Canadian junior champion, out of the contention, winning on the 18th hole.

SAINT JOHN, N.B., July 13 — (CP) — After finishing third in the first heat of the free-for-all George B. Gay's McKillo Cash from Moncton took the next two heats of the feature event on tonight's program of the Southern New Brunswick harness racing circuit.

The first heat winner, Wildcat Volo of St. Stephen, reined by Joe MacDonald, Sydney, set a record of 2:12.5 for the new track.

Dorothy Hal, owned by Early Hayman of St. Stephen, won all three heats of the 2:27 Trot and Pace. The other event, a conditioned trot and pace, went to Baldrick, from Edmundston.

All entries were from New Brunswick, excepting one Maine horse. The meet will continue tomorrow night.
